
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Sree Konaseema Bhanoji Ramars College was established in 1951 in a sprawling campus of 22.92 acres, thanks to the efforts of great freedom fighter, a renowned Gandhian the founding president, late Sri N.Ramabhadra Raju and stalwarts including the chief donor Sri JVB Ramars, Zamindar of Peruru. The College has carved out a niche for itself as a premier educational institution in the field of higher education during the past six decades and a half. It is a government aided college recognized by UGC under 2 (f) and 12 (B) of the UGC Act. Following a request of the college, the NAAC Peer Team visited our college in March 2007, assessed and accredited at B++ grade. The learned members of the team gave some important suggestions for future improvement. Notwithstanding the unhealthy competition from the private corporate colleges coupled with resources crunch the College Management successfully implemented most of these valuable suggestions. The college was bifurcated in August 2010 and the P G courses came under S.K.B.R Post Graduate College under the same Management. M.Sc. (Biotech), MBA, M.A. (Economics), M.A. (English), NHRM and M.Com were added besides the existing MCA and M.Sc. (Organic Chemistry). Subsequent to NAAC accreditation, earnest efforts were made towards improvement keeping in view the seven steps to quality enunciated by NAAC.

Quality is an essential component of higher education and plays a key role in building social capital. It is well recognized that good quality education equips individuals with skills to pursue sustainable livelihood. NAAC has been playing a catalytic role for all quality related activities and has definitely ignited quality culture in Higher Educational Institutes. NAAC has been stressing the importance of benchmarking with a view to encouraging self evaluation and accountability in higher education.

In the post NAAC accreditation period we strived hard to continuously adapt to the changing demands and fine tuned our methodology to achieve tangible results. With the cooperation of all the stakeholders we organized five UGC sponsored National Seminars and another one with financial support of NAAC. Two short term certificate courses were conducted besides some workshops on quality-related matters. Recognizing the role of ICT in improving quality of teaching-learning, it has been incorporated in our class rooms.

With the understanding of our strengths and weaknesses, we attempted systemic corrections. Since quality is a moving target we sincerely made increased efforts in its enhancement in all aspects.

Assuring that the information provided stands for authenticity, we are knocking at the door of NAAC for reaccreditation with confidence and hence submitting our SSR for reaccreditation in the following pages.



Sree Konaseema Bhanoji Ramars College established in 1951 is one of the old and reputed colleges in our state. It is a Govt. Aided college recognized by the UGC under sections 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act.

The mission of the college is to provide value based, need based and career oriented education to the young boys and girls, mostly from poor agriculture families of konaseema.

The college is being run with the single minded devotion of the management in accordance with the norms of UGC, Government of A.P, Adikavi Nannayya University and NAAC.

The NAAC peer team visited our college in March 2007 and accredited our college with B++ grade (Institutional score of 81.0 %). Now the college is all set to welcome the second visit by NAAC peer team for reaccreditation. With the quality culture ignited by NAAC the college management played a proactive role and took steps to achieve excellence in various quality parameters through innovations in teaching learning, research and extension activities, students support and development of infrastructure.

The IQAC of the college which was formed in 2006 prior to the cycle I Assessment & Accreditation by NAAC has been the driving force for all the curricular, co-curricular and extra -curricular activities. The IQAC includes representatives of all stake holders, Management, teachers, non-teaching staff, students and alumni.

A brief survey of the academic, co-curricular and extra- curricular activities is presented criterion wise.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

Curriculum Planning and Implementation

The college has been started with a vision to endeavor for total intellectual and scientific awareness, knowledge and know-how for total professionalism among the youth of knowledge area. The Management works with missionary zeal to impart quality education and to empower on students to face global challenges with competence. The academic planning incorporates the objective, inter alia, to uphold the glorious tradition of our cultural heritage. As the college is affiliated to Adikavi Nannayya University, Rajahmundry (ANUR), the syllabus and academic calendar prescribed by the university are followed for all programmes. The annual curricular plans are prepared based on the syllabus. The curriculum is implemented through continuous assessment in the form of mid-semester examinations and unit tests. Work distribution paper wise is done in the beginning of the academic year at a departmental meeting convened by the HOD. Teaching synopsis/notes for each topic is prepared for effective teaching of the subject concerned. The progress of the syllabus is monitored periodically at departmental meetings. Some of our faculty members are associated as members with the Boards of Studies of the affiliating university and suggest changes in the curriculum in tune with the changing needs. Field trips/study visits are arranged by various departments as a co-curricular activity.

Academic Flexibility

The college offers undergraduate courses of B.A, B.Com (general and vocational) and B.Sc in both English and Telugu media. The JKC is giving effective training in soft skills, technical skills and analytical skills. The college offers various core and effective options to the students under B.A, B.Sc., and B.Com., apart from aided courses the college offers unaided self-finance courses also. The dropouts of the formal stream are enrolled into the distant mode making use of a flexibility provision of the University.

Keeping the employment potential in mind two certificate courses (i) Computer Skills and (ii) Journalism & Mass Communication have been conducted.

Curriculum Enrichment

The academic committee of the college takes care of implementing the curriculum. The curriculum is enriched by bringing about computer literacy among non-computer students and by use of ICT based teaching. The needs of the industry are kept in mind and necessary inputs are given to the students through the class room / JKC to make them Job - ready. The cultural activities committee and women empowerment committee take up various activities to

inculcate moral and ethical values among the students. The principal with the active involvement of the IQAC and academic committee reviews the enrichment programmes conducted by the JKC and gives suggestions. Certificate courses in (i) Computer skills and ii) Journalism and mass communication have been conducted to provide employability to the students. Cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate change, Environmental Education, ICT etc. are integrated into the curriculum with the help of various committees constituted by the principal and also with the help of co-curricular and extra- curricular activities.

Feedback System

Structured feedback from the students and other stake holders is obtained with a view to enriching the curriculum. The suggestions are taken into consideration by the faculty members who are members of the Boards of Studies and taken to the notice of the University.

CRITERION II: TEACHING LEARNING & EVALUATION

Student Enrolment and Profile

The college website and prospectus provide all relevant information about admissions/ rules/ regulations/ courses offered which ensures transparency in admissions. The college provides opportunities for admission to diverse groups of students such as SC's, ST's, OBC's, economically backward classes, differently abled and minorities. All the rules concerning reservations for various categories are strictly implemented. There is adequate demand for admission into our college in spite of proliferation of colleges in the town and the surroundings.

Catering to Student Diversity

The college organizes induction programmes for freshers to infuse confidence. The provisions of the anti ragging act are brought to the notice of the freshers and security against all types of eve-teasing is ensured to the girl students. Slow learners are identified based on performance in unit tests and remedial Coaching is given. Advanced learners are encouraged to appear for competitive examinations. Endowment prizes are given away to academic toppers at the annual day function.

Teaching – Learning Process

The teaching schedules as per the academic plans are followed to ensure satisfactory completion of syllabus. The student centric approach is adopted in teaching – learning process. Innovative teaching methods using LCD Projectors / OHP / Internet / field visits etc. are used to ensure

comprehension of various topics by the students. To enhance learning experience of the students' experimental demonstration is used in subjects such as Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology etc. Proper learning environment is maintained in the class room. The feedback on teachers collected from students is used to give necessary suggestions to the teachers concerned to improve teaching. The students are trained to use computer technology even outside the class room so as to visit the websites concerned to acquire more knowledge in the topics included in the curriculum.

Teacher Quality

The institution has highly qualified and experienced faculty. The teaching faculty includes members of diverse sections of society such as SC's, ST's, BC's and OC's. Faculty members participate in refresher courses as well as orientation programmes which provide excellent opportunities to update / recharge their knowledge in the subject domain. In the matter of recruitment and promotion of faculty the College Management adheres to the UGC/State Govt. norms. The newly appointed faculty members aided / unaided are given induction training in the beginning of the academic year in teaching methodology, student psychology and use of ICT in teaching – learning. The services of the senior faculty of the B.Ed College are solicited for the training. Whenever an aided teacher retires the post becomes unaided and the vacancy is filled by recruiting unaided faculty. No teaching position is left vacant.

Evaluation Process and Reforms

The college adheres to the academic calendar of the affiliating university for the conduct of university examinations. The gradual transition from year-end pattern to semester-end pattern is being implemented in accordance with the norms of the university. The internal examinations such as term wise tests, mid semester examinations etc. are conducted as per the academic plans of the department concerned. The students are apprised of the model question papers and the weightages to different topics in the design of the papers. Information about the mechanism of evaluation is also given to prepare the students. Transparency is ensured in the evaluation of internal examinations.

Student Performance and Learning outcomes

Study material on some important topics is provided to the students. Slow learners are taken care of by providing remedial Coaching. The shortfall in learning outcomes in various subjects are analysed and corrective measures are suggested.

Whenever the examination results are not satisfactory in any subject, the reasons are analysed by way of discussion at the departmental faculty meetings and necessary corrective steps such as personal counseling to the students with poor academic background and poor comprehension levels besides remedial Coaching have been planned and implemented. The help of fast learners is also provided. Attention is paid to promote graduate attributes such as discipline, job skills and social skills as part of teaching- learning. To make the students job ready certain job skills such as communication skills are also given importance through JKC. Value education is another area being pursued.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Promotion of Research

The institution encourages the faculty through the research committee, to take up research for M.Phil/Ph.D. About 59% of aided faculty members are holding Ph.D degrees and 9% of aided faculty is having M.Phil degree received from different Universities during the post-accreditation period. At present 36% of aided faculty have registered themselves for Ph.D and one has registered for M.Phil. One major Research project funded by the UGC was completed and another has been sanctioned and is going on. One minor research project was completed and another is on-going.

Resource Mobilization for Research

The College Management encourages the teachers and the students to use the infrastructure facilities available for taking up research project in various departments in general and science departments in particular.

Research Projects

Though the college is not a recognized research centre, the staff doing Ph.D/M.Phil in different universities are encouraged to use the infrastructure facilities such as sophisticated equipment / instruments / internet available in the college.

Research Publications and Awards

As many as 34 research papers have been published in national and international Journals besides about 100 papers have been presented at various national / international seminars / workshops by our faculty members during the post accreditation period. Some of our faculty members have contributed articles to various vernacular newspapers / magazines. Some of the faculty members have received research awards for their research contributions in their respective fields.

Consultancy

College Management encourages the faculty members to offer consultancy on various matters mostly free of cost with the objective of utilizing their expertise and knowhow for the farmers, business concerns, literary & cultural organizations and others. It is pertinent to mention the consultancy services of LIC of Zoology in matters related to aquaculture in our area and outside. In some cases consultancy fee is collected in cash and test kits with chemicals.

Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

Extension activities are mainly carried out by the NSS/NCC units as well as the other committees such as the Red Ribbon Club and Women Empowerment Cell. NSS units conducted awareness programmes concerning health & hygiene, environment, water conservation & harvesting etc., during their special campus in the adopted villages. A voluntary organization started by the biology students of the college has been extending services to economically backward students, inmates of old age homes, deaf and dumb besides visually impaired and orphans by raising funds through individual contributions and donations from the staff.

Collaborations

Academic linkages have been established with research institutions and industrial establishments by way of MoUs with Horticulture Research Institute, Ambajipeta, and Aquaculture industry.

CRITERION IV:INFRASTRUCTURE & LEARNING RESOURCES

Physical Facilities

All necessary facilities for effective teaching – learning are available in the college. With sprawling campus spread over 22.9 acres and 42 spacious and well-ventilated class-rooms the college provides an ideal environment for academic and co-curricular activities. All the departments have separate staff rooms with the necessary furniture and equipment. All the science laboratories are provided with necessary facilities for conducting practicals qualitatively. The computer systems with internet facility which are available in most of the departments are used for imparting general computer education to all students. The college Management takes special interest in augmenting the infrastructural facilities from time to time. The available facilities are being used optimally. Excellent facilities such as gymnasium and Sports complex are provided for encouraging Sports and Games. Two auditoriums (one indoor and one out door) are used for extra-curricular activities. A multipurpose play ground with 12 acres of play field is available.

Library as a Learning Resource

The central library is a two-storied building with an area of 10,300 sq.ft. It has facilities such as reading room, computers with internet, reprography, safe drinking water etc. Text books, reference books, journals, periodical etc. are available to cater to the needs of the students.

The library advisory committee gives suggestions for augmenting the library resources every year. The library staff assists the students for borrowing books from the library. The issue of books is made user-friendly. The library conducts “National Library Week” celebrations every year and prizes are distributed to the winners of various competitions conducted in this connection.

IT Infrastructure

Adequate number of computer systems is available in the college with up-to-date configuration. The computers with printers and scanners are utilized for the preparation of teaching-learning material in various subjects. The maintenance of the computers is taken care of with the help of the hardware technician of the college.

Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Funds are earmarked in the college budget for the maintenance of campus facilities such as water coolers, buildings, roads, water supply, electricity etc. The funds allocated for the maintenance of the infrastructure are properly utilized and audited.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT & PROGRESSION

Student Mentoring and Support

Information about the student welfare measures such as scholarships (EBC, SC, ST & BC) endowment prizes, group insurance, cash awards etc., is provided in the college prospectus and website. Students participating in the Zonal/State/National level Sports & Games competitions are encouraged by the Management by reimbursing the travelling and other incidental expenses from out of the special fee funds. JKC is providing training to the students for competitive examinations and soft skill development besides giving information about career opportunities. Students are encouraged to participate in various cultural activities both inside and outside the campus. The anti-ragging committee affectively monitors the interaction of the freshers with their seniors. The students are sensitized on the provisions of the anti-ragging act at a meeting addressed by the principal, police officials and senior advocates. The college has a registered alumni association which plays a

significant role in college development. Student's grievances redressal committee takes steps for timely redressal of the grievances in matters such as drinking water, sanitation etc. No incidents of sexual harassment have ever been reported. However, the discipline committee maintains strict vigilance. Large percentage of our students is from SC,ST,BC,EBC and OBC categories (Boys & Girls). Specific support in the form of government scholarships etc is provided.

Student Progression

The progression of students in various programmes of the institutions is regularly monitored at all levels. The dropout rate is rather insignificant. It is observed that most of the students are having poor academic background and the need for initiating special efforts to improve pass percentage in all the core subjects has been recognized and necessary plans are devised. Most of the pass outs are in search of employment opportunities in the public as well as private sectors. They are appearing and qualifying in various competitive examinations and are settling comfortably in various jobs.

Student Participation and Activities

Our students are accorded a participatory role in the administration and progression of the institution. Student representatives are included in various committees such as IQAC, library advisory committee, JKC, NSS, magazine committee, anti-ragging committee etc. Students are bringing laurels to the college by winning awards/prizes at zonal, state and national levels. Feedback from students is given due consideration in the formulation of academic, curricular and extracurricular activities.

CRITERION VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

Institutional Vision and Leadership

The objectives of higher education are designed to transform the country into a knowledge society and to make our students come up to global standards. The vision, mission and goals of our college are in tune with the objectives of higher education. The College Management strives hard with single minded devotion to develop the college. The affairs of the college are managed in a democratic manner marked by decentralization of decision- making at different levels. The Management takes a holistic view of the college development and formulates policies and plans after due consultations with the principal, staff and other stakeholders. The Management monitors the execution of the policies with the effective involvement of the principal and all members of the Governing Body.

Strategy Development and Deployment

The institution has a perspective plan document which incorporates the priorities for utilization of UGC grants, subject to guidelines. The institution has a well defined organizational structure with allotment of duties and accountability with provision for transparency at all levels. The IQAC acts as driving force for all activities with the avowed aim of ensuring quality of education.

Faculty Empowerment Strategies

The recruitment and promotion aspects of employees are guided by the rules in force. All the policies of Government of India/Govt. of A.P with regard to recruitment/promotions/retirement are adhered to. The Management looks after the welfare of the employees by arranging loans to the needy through the cooperative credit society. The academic advisors appointed by the CCE receive self-appraisal reports submitted by the faculty members and give necessary suggestions to the college administration for improvement of their performance. The institution conducts programmes periodically for the professional development of the teaching staff. Seminars/workshops/guest lectures are arranged at college/regional/national level.

Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

The college annual budget is prepared keeping in view the needs of various departments including the library and physical education. The spending of resources is done strictly as per the budget and the accounts are audited.

Internal Quality Assurance System

The IQAC monitors all aspects concerning teaching-learning and other activities of the college. The IQAC serves as a watch dog in ensuring quality of education and provides guidance for conducting seminar/workshops. The suggestions of the external experts of the IQAC are taken in planning the activities.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

Environment Consciousness

The college campus is marked with greenery with shade giving trees, ornamental plants, flowering plants, coconutsetc. Internal green audit is conducted. The campus is made eco-friendly with the implementation of banning on plastic cups and carry bags. Swachh Bharat Programme is taken up periodically to keep the campus clean with the enthusiastic participation of

staff and students. E-waste is managed by selling away in the second-hand market.

Innovations

The senior staff members of various departments take keen interest in formulation of the characteristics of innovations. Water conservation and harvesting which recharge the ground water levels are given priority.

Best Practices

With a view to computerizing all aspects of college administration besides upgrading the library services to staff and students a project has been taken up to provide basic computer skills to the non-teaching staff in the administration office as well as departments. Office assistance in various sections and secretarial staff in the departments including library acquired computer literacy after the training. Administrative work hitherto carried out manually has been placed by computerization toning up the quality of administration,

Another best practice involved developing the spirit of computation among students through physical education. The innate talents of the students in Sports and Games have been identified and fully developed. The available excellent infrastructure facilities have been utilized to prepare the students for higher level performance. Basking on the Coaching given in various events our students proved their mettle and bagged several prestigious prizes and medals in Sports and Games competitions at the district level, state level and national level year after year and brought laurels to the college.



Vision:

- To ignite the minds of the youth in learning environment of high academic excellence by channeling and synchronizing their energies with scientific competence
- To impart quality education which moulds the holistic personality of the student
- To inculcate socially relevant value based knowledge to integrate tradition and modernity in professional life.
- To equip and empower students with relevant knowledge and competence to face global challenges with creativity.
- To facilitate optimum use of available resources for sustainable development

- To aim for qualitative growth in academic infrastructure, physical infrastructure, teaching-learning process etc.
- To give thrust on continuous improvement of the quality of teacher and quality of teaching.
- To prepare the students to combat challenges posed by the modern competitive society

- To focus on research based education with quality parameters.
- To adopt total quality management principles for institutional governance and management.
- To deliver effectively the knowledge and skills prescribed for particular programmes through creativity and innovation in teaching and evaluation.
- The goals and objectives are known to all stakeholders through its administrative setup, curriculum, print media, general meetings, classroom teachings, review meetings etc.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

College prepares annual curricular plans based upon the academic calendar and syllabi provided by Adikavi Nannayya University. The curriculum is effectively implemented in the institution through annual academic plan, time table, curricular and co-curricular activities and through continuous assessment in the form of unit tests, term examinations and annual examinations. Academic coordinator of the college guides and monitors the activities on the campus for effective implementation of the curriculum.

Month wise and week wise allocation of the syllabus is prepared in the annual academic plan for every subject. Teaching synopsis/notes for each topic is prepared for effective teaching of the subjects concerned. Teaching and evaluation is done according to the time table prepared by the institution.

Every member of the faculty prepares teaching diary giving highlights of the topic covered in the class. The diary is submitted on the first working day of next month to the principal through the LIC of the department concerned.

The progress of the syllabus coverage is monitored periodically at Meetings of the members of the department convened by the head of the department. Whenever necessary, extra classes are conducted.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The teachers receive support from the institution in several forms for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices. They are provided infrastructural support, given adequate freedom to ensure participatory approach in teaching –learning and any proposals for academic activities are approved with the concurrence of the college academic committee/IQAC.

Our university frames the syllabus and academic calendar for every academic year. Faculty members are getting support through orientation courses, refresher courses, special language training programmes arranged by various universities. The college also provides orientation programmes for enrichment of teaching skills. These programmes are of immense importance for effective translation of curriculum to the students. Guest lectures are arranged in the college on teaching methodology to improve teaching practices.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provide by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The college covers a broad spectrum of academic programmes in the form of curricular activities like lecturing, tutorials, seminars, and ICT based teaching for effective delivery of the curriculum provided by the Adikavi Nannaya University. The learning skills of the students are improved by arranging class room seminars on various topics of the curricular, co-curricular and extra curricular activities are also taken up.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum.

Various departments of the college arrange field trips to the nearby villages, industries and places of importance as a part of academic programmes and for effective implementation of the curriculum. Academic linkages are established with Aqua Industry in Konaseema, Horticulture Research Station, Ambajipeta and students interacted with the scientists and technocrats.

1.1.6. What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

Many of our senior faculty members are associated with Boards of Studies of the affiliated university from time to time to suggest the recent developments/changes to be added to the curriculum and to offer suggestions for revamping the curriculum. Feedback collected from stakeholders as well as the outcome of the staff discussions are forwarded in BoS meetings.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? Accounting Executive course was designed by the college in the year 2008. Students are trained in Tally accounting package as part of JKC programme. A 4 months duration programme has been designed to enable the commerce students getting jobs as accounting executives in corporate sector. The syllabus was designed keeping in view the directions of Commissionerate of

Collegiate Education, JKC monitoring cell and the package of tally solutions. Two batches were trained in the year 2008. In the year 2012 a certificate course on Journalism/Report writing skills through computers was introduced. The curriculum for the certificate courses was designed by the faculty members drafted as resource persons

1.1.8 How does institution analyse/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation.

The college organises interactive sessions with the old students to promote innovative measures in different fields. Feedback is also taken from the old students on phones for such programmes. Under the continuous process of evolution the college is evaluating the results and progression of the students from time to time. These methods have helped the institution to ensure that the students have learnt the subject delivered by teaching as per the curriculum.

The college has under graduate courses of B.A., B.Com. (General and Vocational) and B.Sc., in both English and Telugu medium. The college is also offering 4 months skill development course through JKC (Jawahar Knowledge Centre) platform. It is a purely job oriented training course. The students get acquainted with soft skills, and technical skills besides analytical skills. Two certificate courses (i) Computer Skills ii) Journalism and Mass communication as been offered train institution.

No. The college offers three years degree courses only. The present affiliation system gives no scope for twinning/ dual degree.

Andhra University, Visakhapatnam followed grade system till 2013-14 pass outs. The college affiliation was shifted from Andhra University, Visakhapatnam to Adikavi Nannaya University, Rajahmundry with effect from the 2012-13 admitted batch. Adikavi Nannaya University, Rajahmundry followed non-grading system. First year degree came under the umbrella of Adikavi Nannaya University from the academic year 2012-13 and second year degree from the academic year 2013-14. All the three year degree courses came under the purview of Adikavi Nannaya University during 2014-15. The credit system was implemented on 10 point scale and the students were grouped under 7 categories i.e. O, A, B, C, D, E and F, when the college was affiliated to Andhra University.

At present the institution follows common core syllabus as prescribed by the Adikavi Nannaya University. The institution provides the following core and elective options.

The college has an academic activities committee for implementing the curriculum. The committee arranges regular academic meetings for analyzing academic activities. The college is providing practical oriented programme in subjects like Computer Course and Computer Skills. ICT based teaching is also

provided by the college as apart of the university curriculum and academic programme to reach the institutional goals and objectives besides giving value additions to syllabus. Student seminars, guest lectures and field trips etc. are also conducted.

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experience of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

Employment opportunities are available mostly in the private sector. Since the students passing out from the institution should stand in the dynamic employment market the necessary skills are incorporated into the curriculum to suit the needs such as employers. Enrichment courses such as accounting executive, tally and Journalism are offered.

The college follows the syllabus of the affiliating university. In order to enrich and modify the curriculum, feedback from the students at the end of the course is taken and the suggestions are brought to the notice of the Board of Studies for modification. The experiences of the pass outs that are selected for appointment by various recruiting agencies are shared with the outgoing batches through the JKC.

1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

Gender issue and Human Rights are in the 1st year graduation course as a part of Foundation Course-I. The issues relating to climate are being dealt in 2nd year graduation course as a part of Environmental Studies. ICT and the latest development in Science and Technology are being dealt with the 3rd year graduation course as a part of Foundation Course -II. The syllabus is so designed incorporating ICT in the curriculum of general English subject equipping students with the knowledge and communication skills suitable for global demands. In addition cross cutting issues are taken care of while teaching and in conducting extra curricular activities.

1.3.4. What are the various value-add courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of student?

- **Moral and ethical values**

Value education is integrated in curriculum in different aspects. Guest lectures on moral and ethical values have been arranged. The members from various faiths namely Brahma Kumari Samaja are invited to deliver lectures on

moral values and inculcate the spirit of communal harmony and universal brotherhood among the students.

- **Employable and life skills**

The institution is striving to develop employable and life skills through JKC and English Language Labs. Career guidance Cell also organises programmes for improving job skills

- **Better career options**

The Career Guidance Cell is creating awareness among the students about various career opportunities available to them. Coaching for P.G CET is also provided in summer vacation for Arts, Commerce and Science subjects. Model 'AUCET' and Model 'ICET' examinations are being conducted on our campus during summer. Proper guidance is also provided to the students. The college also shoulders the responsibility of processing ONLINE APPLICATIONS of the students seeking admission into Post Graduation and Professional courses.

- **Community orientation**

- Community orientation is given due importance while planning the activities of the NSS and NCC units. Training imparted to the NSS volunteers and NCC cadets before and during the activities in the adopted villages is done with community orientation such that the activities sensitise the local population on health and hygiene, environment, sanitation, water conservation etc.
- Special camps include activities such as blood donation, clean and green / Swachh Bharat, literacy, AIDS/HIV awareness, voter awareness etc. Red Ribbon Club, Women Empowerment Cell, Mythri Mahala Seva Samstha are also taking up service activities with community orientation

1.3.5. Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The need for the introduction of some topics in Mathematics, Statistics and Commerce subjects was suggested to the Adikavi Nannaya University during the seminar held in Rajahmundry in the year 2014 represented by Principal in charge of the college. Similar views were expressed during the seminar held in Visakhapatnam in the year 2011 by one of our faculty members from Department of Economics. The feedback collected from the Stakeholders stressed the incorporation of socially relevant topics in the curriculum.

1.3.6. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

Monthly academic meetings are conducted by the principal. Feedback from the students is also analysed and assessed by the principal to evaluate the quality of teaching. The faculty is motivated to take note of the opinion of the students in a way to improve quality of teaching wherever required.

1.4 Feedback System**1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?**

The feedbacks obtained from faculty with regard to courses/subjects are analyzed through discussions during the academic meetings. Accordingly, necessary recommendations are made to the affiliating universities by our faculty members who happen to be members of Board of Studies for different subjects.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes. Feedback is collected from the students by way of a questionnaire concerning relevance of curriculum and the quality of teaching. The suggestions are taken note of and suggestions with substance, if any, are communicated to the university through members of Board of Studies. Regular feedback is obtained from the stakeholders.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/Courses were introduced by the institution during the last 4 years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

New courses like B.Com. (Vocational) and B.Sc., Computer Science are introduced by the institution in order to develop computer skills which are very essential for facing present day competitive world and also for better employment opportunities. They were introduced partly based on student needs and feedback.

Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

The teaching process is guided by the curriculum for a particular subject prescribed by the affiliating university. However, certain changes in the curriculum have been suggested in tune with the changing trends to strengthen the knowledge base of the learners. As the recruiting agencies are mostly in the private sector, the HR managers are looking for candidates who are “Job ready “. These aspects are kept in mind and necessary guidance is given through JKC to make our students stand in the competitions vis-à-vis their peers from other institutions.

The institution’s distinctive characteristics are designed to reflect the mission statement. The needs of the society are realized from feed back from the society and job requirements. Accordingly the courses are enriched and offered to the students. The institution has setup good traditions right from its inception like strengthening of courses and curricula and inculcating sincerity, punctuality among the students and teachers. The institution gives top priority to impart to the students value based education to shape them into better citizens of the nation. The institution is addressing the needs of the society by its quality output. The institution is dedicated to achieve the National and Global goals of education.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile.

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college ensures publicity and transparency in the admission process as stated below.

➤ **Prospectus**

Prospectus is published every year, containing the details of courses offered, availability of groups, fee structure, programmes, admission policy and procedure, method of applying, last date for submission of application.

➤ **Institutional website (www.skbrcollege.org)**

The details of the admission process are published in college website.

➤ **Any other specify**

College gains publicity by word of mouth. Flexi banners are displayed at prominent places.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) Merit

(ii) Common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies

(iii) Combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview

(iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution?

The college offers both conventional and self-finance courses at undergraduate level. As per the directives of the university, date of sale of application forms is notified on the notice board. Admission committee constituted by the principal looks after all aspects concerning admissions.

Under Graduate Courses:

Students are selected for admission based on the marks secured in the qualifying examination and reservation. Once the candidates are called for interview, the selection committee members verify the marks of the qualifying examination and other certificates required.

The counseling team helps the students to make the choice of the medium of instruction and subjects. College follows reservation policy of the government and ensures equity and inclusion.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The college offers three year Under Graduate degree courses in Humanities, Science, Commerce, Computer Application and Computer Science streams. Admission is strictly done after framing the merit list for all the courses. The admissions are made according to the eligibility criteria laid down by Adikavi Nannayya University, Rajahmundry, Andhra Pradesh.

The institution has the record of getting its seats filled at the earliest as compared to the other colleges within the town in respect of computer related courses. Additional course B.Com (Vocational) was also introduced from 2015-16 academic year. The selection of students for various courses is made on the merit basis as per the directions of Adikavi Nannayya University, Rajahmundry.

Information pertaining to the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level is given here under.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If ‘yes’ what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, there is a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually. For this purpose Admissions Committee is constituted with senior faculty members to review the admission process. The committee verifies whether the merit cum reservations followed in preparing the selection list for admissions, or not. The college reviews the profiles of students admitted annually. The institution has a very clear cut, well defined and well-designed mechanism as far as the reviewing of the profiles of the students is concerned. The admission committee reviews the profiles of students selected for admission and chalks out a comparative summary of the selected candidates. In case a particular section of students like women, those from rural areas or any specific community are found to be a few in the admission lists, the admission committee tries to motivate those sections of students by providing necessary counseling. The activities of students are closely monitored. A record of their performance in all the fields, academic as well as extra-curricular is maintained in the office. The students who bring laurels to the institution in the academics, Sports, extra-curricular, or other similar areas are duly rewarded. The students with a little bit of negative approach or disturbing tendencies are motivated with counseling so that a positive frame of mind can be developed.

Outcome:

As a result of this process, in the last five years the college has observed a sharp rise in the students’ discipline. They have learnt to channelize their energy and their potential into more constructive activities.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

The institution provides admission to the candidates from open category, scheduled caste, scheduled tribe, backward classes, differentially-abled and Sports category as per the rules of reservation; 33% of seats are internally reserved for women in each category. To increase / improve access for different categories of students the following strategies are adopted.

Students from SC/ST/OBC Community:

Students from SC/ST and other backward classes are allotted seats as per roster system of the state policy. Fee exemption and endowment benefits are also extended to these students. The college facilitates the students with special book bank provided by different agencies. The college makes tireless efforts to create awareness on the importance of higher studies i.e. education as a means of socio economic change and a means of empowerment. The college takes steps to sensitize the students of these communities on the various facilities / scholarships available to them through social welfare department and other sources such as UGC. The college also arranges extension lectures and career counseling for the students falling under the categories mentioned above. Through reservation policy, access is ensured to these marginalized groups through the total implementation of reservation-cum-merit as per the government policy. Reservation is ensured at all levels of admission namely UG and PG courses. At present the reservation quota is as follows:

Women:

In the admission process 33% quota for women is followed. Hostel facility is provided from Social Welfare department. The college provides counseling to the needy parents of women students on the importance of women education, exclusive facilities available for women, financial incentives, security and protection provision. It also ensures feasible conveyance to women students to reach the college by public transport system (APSRTC).

Differently-abled:

As per the rule of reservation 3% seats are reserved for students belonging to differently abled categories. Special scholarships, Coaching is provided as per the instruction of the government and the affiliating university. They are allowed to take examinations in the rooms of ground floor only.

Economically Weaker Sections of the Society:

Students belonging to economically weaker sections of the society are extended various benefits like fee reimbursement and scholarships.

Minority:

The college under the direction from the State Government and its affiliating university follows 4% reservation in admissions and offers every possible help to the students belonging to the minority community. Scholarships are provided by minority welfare society.

Any other:

In Sports and Games 3% seats reserved and allotted on the basis merit at regional or national level. Even for NSS, NCC and children of ex-servicemen 3% of seats are reserved in each course.

Statutory reservations:

Seats reserved to various categories are:

- a) Scheduled Caste: 15%
- b) Scheduled Tribe: 6%
- c) Other Backward Caste: 25%
- d) Minority Community (BC-E): 4%
- e) Differentially-abled: 3%
- f) Sports and Games: 3%
- g) NCC & NSS: 3%
- h) Non-Local: 15%

The demand ratio of admissions in B.Com (CA), B.Com (G) is due to more job opportunities but in other courses there is steady progress due to heavy competition from other institutions.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- Scholarships are provided to the differently-abled candidates and special Coaching is also offered to them as per the instruction of the government and the affiliating university. They are sensitized about various government schemes which are applicable to them.
- Special classes are conducted.

- Physically challenged students are allowed to take examinations in the rooms of ground floor only.
- Scribes are allowed for visually challenged candidates.
- As per the State Government policy 3% reservation is followed for students belonging to differently-abled categories.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. The institution tries to assess the student's needs by taking note of the skill gaps, knowledge gaps, academic drawbacks, physical and psychological weak points and inadequate background support. Necessary information regarding the student's needs is received by way of queries at the time of admission and also during interaction with freshers in the respective departments.

The gaps of learning skills in a particular candidate are identified at the time of admission and during the first few classes. Efforts are put in place by the faculty members during class room interaction with the students to bridge the gaps. This is done with a view to help the student(s) prepare for life long learning. Students are made to understand that "Learning how to Learn" is a master skill. Students are encouraged to:

- Concentrate better in class
- Take better notes
- Review those notes regularly
- They may ask questions in the class room whenever they do not understand any point
- Reference books/text books/references are suggested
- Make a good study time table and adhere to it
- Do their home work
- Refer old question papers
- Understand how to develop resilience to overcome stress

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Some Intermediate pass outs with science groups join humanities or commerce groups at the UG level. To bridge the knowledge gap vis-à-vis other students and enable them to cope with the new courses, the first few classes at the beginning of the academic year are devoted to impart some basic knowledge concerning subject(s). However, remedial Coaching is provided to see that academically backward students attain the required knowledge levels.

Enrichment courses such as tally and accounting executive are also taken up to bridge the knowledge gaps of the students.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- The college sensitizes its staff and students on issues such as gender inclusion and environment by conducting awareness programme on anti-raging.
- The college itself is maintained as plastic- free and eco-friendly with full greenery.
- Conduct of awareness programmes for women students by inviting the gynaecologist and to enlighten the steps to be taken for health and hygiene.
- Encouragement is given to the women students for participation in Games and Sports and cultural activities on par with men.
- In all categories 33% seats allotted to the women students.
- A separate waiting room is provided for women students.
- Our college has established Red Ribbon Club with 100 volunteers with the awareness of HIV/AIDS – Life skills.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced Learners

- The institution identifies the advanced learners on the basis of their merit as well as their performance in the interactive sessions.
- Encouraged to participate actively in campus drives for job opportunities.
- Encouraged to participate in quiz programmes and seminars conducted by the college.
- Advanced learners are awarded donor prizes/endowment prizes in different Science, Arts & Commerce subjects.
- They are motivated to pursue higher studies and other competitive exams.
- Study projects are being conducted by the students with the guidance of faculty.
- Reference books are made available to the students.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

- Through the class teachers, the data and information on the academic performance of the students is collected and it is analyzed in the departmental meetings.
- The dropout percentage is around 5% only.
- However the following measures are taken to minimize the dropout rates.
 - a. Remedial Coaching classes are conducted regularly.
 - b. Scholarships are provided to the economically weaker sections by the government.
- To ensure equity among the disadvantaged community (SC, ST and BC)scholarships, fee reimbursement, separate book banks in the library and limited hostel facilities are provided.
- Thus the dropout rate of the students from disadvantaged sections of society is controlled.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print etc.)

- In the beginning of the academic year, all the faculty members review, discuss and prepare annual academic plans dividing the syllabus into viable teaching units and they are systematically taught using the lesson plans and synopsis. The annual academic plans include curricular activities and also co curricular activities. The well-prepared plan is implemented in the academic year as per the schedule.
- The syllabus is unitized and teaching plan is prepared for the entire unit. The unit includes tests and co-curricular activities.
- A review meeting is held at the end of every month to monitor the implementation of the teaching plan.
- Extra classes, if necessary, are conducted to cover the back log of the syllabus.
- Assignments are given to the students and are assessed periodically.
- Periodic tests, group discussions are also conducted as a part of teaching and learning evaluation schedule.

- The performance of the students in the periodical tests and pre-final examinations are evaluated and analysed.
- Surprise visit by the principal during the class work and laboratory work and interact with the students regarding coverage of syllabus quality of teaching and learning.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The IQAC is instrumental in improving teaching learning process and administration performance of the institution. It provides platform for organizing workshops, seminars on quality of education and also acts as the driving force for all the teaching – learning activities in the institution.

As the student is the main beneficiary of the institution, the learning in various programmes is made student – centric. A number of support structures and systems are available for teachers to develop various learning skills among the students.

Support structures:

- Seminar halls
- Spacious and well ventilated class rooms
- E-class rooms
- Central library with a large number of text books, reference books, magazines, Journals, periodicals etc.
- LCD Projectors
- Labs & research projects
- Scope for field visits

Systems available:

- Guest lectures by experts
- Quiz programmes, group discussion
- Study visits to nearby industries / research organizations
- Participation of students in seminars and other competitions
- Class room seminars, study projects
- Participation in inter-collegiate competitions.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The learning experiences are made effective by using modern technologies such as OHP presentation, power point presentation.
- Botany, Zoology departments maintain herbarium and museum to create scientific temper in the minds of the students.
- Exhibitions are conducted by Botany department by exhibiting medicinal plants.
- Students are apprised of the inclusion in our Constitution ‘scientific temper, humanism and spirit of inquiry and reform’ as one of the fundamental duties of all citizens of India. (Article 51A (h))
- JKC provides soft skills and communicative skills.
- Providing latest development in all subjects for lifelong learning.
- Students are advised to develop scientific temper and shun superstitions, unscientific beliefs and mysticism.
- Students are encouraged to participate in activities such as science festivals organised by “Jana Vigna Vedika (JVV)”, a people’s science organization during holidays.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The following technologies and facilities are available used by the faculty for better teaching.

- Well established laboratories with live experiment facilities are available.
- The institute encourages e-learning resource from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning, National Mission on Education through information and communication technology. Teachers are encouraged to use LCD projector, computers, internet, VCD in technology and learning process.
- Faculty trained in orientation and refresher courses in computer skills and information technology in turn share the knowledge with other faculty members of the institute.
- Central library

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- Several supplementary methods are used by the teachers to encourage independent learning among the students.
- All the departments conduct debates, seminars, guest lectures, group discussions and question-answer sessions regularly.
- Reputed scientific journals are being subscribed through library. Faculty and students use the journals for updating their knowledge.
- Students are encouraged to present the reports of survey and project works.
- Use of LCD projectors for highlighting the key points of the lecture with necessary explanations.
- Faculty is encouraged to attend orientation courses, refresher courses, seminars, conferences and workshops to update knowledge on contemporary issues, research methodologies, teaching skills etc.
- Invited lecturers, inter college, faculty exchange are best platforms to share and exchange the knowledge on inter disciplinary subjects.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional Counselling/ mentoring/ academic advise) provided to students?

- The college conducts various programmes for the all-round development of the students. It monitors their overall performance in various activities.
- Points out strengths and areas for development in each student.
- Helps the students to set long term career goals and short term learning objectives to enable them to perform effectively.

- Review meetings are held about students' performance in the previous annual examinations.
- The performance of the students is assessed through monthly tests and terminal examinations.
- Science students are assessed continuously through their practical records and field reports.
- The committee keeps in mind the university guidelines with regard to students attendance. The attendance of the students is monitored regularly.
- A record for the participation of students in co-curricular activities like seminars, group discussions etc., is maintained by the department concerned and students are counseled periodically.
- Remedial measures are taken up in respect of students who have not shown good performance.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college encourages the teachers to keep themselves abreast of the latest development in their respective fields. They are encouraged to use computers, internet and library to enrich their teaching. The college faculty is also provided training on the use of computers and the latest software, so that they can devise modern teaching aids to be used in their classrooms. To provide innovative teaching, learning experiences. The following efforts are made by the institution:

- Teaching through OHP, visual charts, PPT, through LCDs and Internet
- Periodical quiz programmes are conducted.
- Faculty are encouraged to participate in orientation and refresher courses to upgrade their knowledge. The department of English made use of CD's while teaching Shakespeare Dramas, Novels of Jane Austen etc. Video clippings of speeches by Martin Luther King are used by JKC to show the impact of body language.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

Library is an excellent learning resource for teaching learning process. Text books, reference books, journals, periodicals, daily newspapers etc. are the resources used to improve the teaching –learning process in an effective manner. Staff and students have easy access to the central library. Magazines and periodicals useful for updating knowledge by students and staff are

provided with latest editions, materials, yearbooks for bank examinations, campus drives, state government jobs etc. Book exhibition is arranged during library week celebrations.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If ‘yes’, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, The institution is constrained to face some challenges which cause disruption to the academic plans. Bandh calls by political parties, boycotts of classes in response to calls given by state student organizations on various issues, natural calamities such as cyclones often disturb the academic schedule. Though any such dislocation of academic work puts burden on the faculty, the institution takes steps to overcome the challenges by adopting strategies such as organizing extra classes. During the last academic year the “Samaikyandhra Agitation” which continued for more than 60 days threw the academic schedule out of gear. However, with the cooperation of all the stakeholders the academic year was saved. The academic plans were rescheduled with classes on holidays including Sundays.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The format-I for the performance appraisal report and format-II for self appraisal of teacher supplied by UGC are used to evaluate the teacher.
- Feedback from students on teaching and other activities is collected in prescribed proforma supplied by Commissioner of Collegiate Education, Andhra Pradesh.
- The feedback is systematically analyzed, discussed and corrective measures are initiated and awarded score – Annual Performance Indicators (API) and the same was placed in Commissionerate website.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

Government of Andhra Pradesh recruits the faculty of the college through Public Service Commission and also by transfers from time to time. The college has required number of qualified and competent teachers to teach the courses. The existing vacancies are filled by the college management with temporary faculty.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

New subjects such as Bio-chemistry and Bio-technology have been introduced to enable to our students to opt for emerging areas of study. Management provides qualified faculty for the new courses by new appointments. Orientation for the newly appointed lecturers is provided by way of internal seminars arranged by IQAC or by deputing them to orientation programmes organized by the university.

b) Faculty Training programmes organized by the institution to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching learning.

The Institution organized the following programmes to enrich the technical skills for the faculty.

- **Teaching learning methods/approaches:** IQAC conducting several seminars and workshops to learn teaching methods and approaches
- **Handling new curriculum:** Our college faculty members deputed to DNR Govt.Degree College, Palakollu for two-day Regional Seminar on Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) curriculum.
- **Content/knowledge management:** Techniques of browsing internet and downloading relevant information concerning the topics in the curriculum are given to faculty and the content is integrated into the text book information.
- **Selection, development and use of enrichment materials:** Providing latest knowledge through latest books from library to enrich the knowledge of faculty. Only the relevant material is selected and given to the students during class room teaching.
- **Assessment:** The faculty members are sensitized on the methods of assessment and evaluation. The assessment of the student's performance is done on the basis of participatory learning, participation in class room seminars / cultural activities / extension activities. Evaluation is done on the basis of principles of valuation. In slip tests / unit tests even self evaluation is also advocated.
- **Cross Cutting Issues:** Faculty members are sensitized on cross – cutting issues such as environment, gender, HIV/AIDS, service conduct rules etc. during programmes/activities.
- **Audio Visual Aids/multimedia:** Our institution providing e-class rooms to faculty to catch-up with the present trends of learning.
- **OER's:** Open Education Resources (OERs) such as newspapers which are freely accessible in the college library are made use of by the faculty and any relevant information pertaining to any topic in the curriculum is incorporated into the lesson plan. The students are also encouraged to go through the articles/write up on special topics.
- **Teaching learning material development, selection and use:** The refresher courses / orientation programmes enable the faculty members to update their knowledge concerning various topics in the curriculum. With these inputs teachers develop teaching-learning material and use them for class room teaching.

c) Percentage of faculty:

- Invited as resource persons in Workshops/Seminars/Conferences organized by external professional agencies: 9%
- Participated in external Workshops/ Seminars / Conferences recognized by national/ international professional bodies: 75%
- Presented papers in Workshops/Seminars/Conferences conducted or recognized by professional agencies: 50%

- Faculty members are encouraged to attend the refresh courses for 21 days and orientation programme for one month and leave on duty is allowed.
- During the last four years ten members attended orientation programme and twenty members attended refresher courses.
- Constant support is extended for those who are engaging in minor research projects, national seminars, and workshops.
- Research grants provided by UGC.
- The research outputs are published in national, international journals. (Details are given under 3.4.3 of criterion III).

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance /achievement of the faculty.

Our NAAC Co-ordinator Dr.E.R.Subrahmanyam, received State Best Teacher Award in the year 2009. This Achievement promoted research culture among the faculty and also strengthened JKC.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching learning process?

Yes, a feedback proforma to evaluate teacher is being circulated to students and external peers at the end of each academic year and the same is analyzed, awarding score accordingly. Positive comments are appreciated and any lapses mentioned are recommended for correction and improvement.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The students are informed about the pattern of the examinations, model question papers, evaluation methodology and other details in the regular class room teaching. The college adopts annual patterns and semester of examinations prescribed by the affiliating university and the students are evaluated on the basis of their performance in the internal examinations besides university examinations.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution adopts the evaluation reforms formed by the affiliating university from time to time. Internal assessment marks are awarded to the students as per the university guidelines.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- College is affiliated to Adikavi Nannayya University, Rajahmundry, and evaluation process is under the guidance of the university
- The universities keep results on website like www.nannayyauniversity.info
- Conduct of supplementary examinations for failures.
- Quick response in case of malpractices of students in the final exams.
- Senior faculty members deputed as chief examiners at the spot valuation and implement the instructions of the University.
- For internal exams such as unit test, mid semester examinations and term wise examinations the university pattern is mostly followed for internal assessment participation in class rooms seminars experimental skill etc. are taken in consideration.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

- The institute conducts unit tests, term examinations, pre-final examinations as a part of formative evaluation approach and the marks are posted in departmental marks register to measure student's performance.

- The college adopts semester system for Ist year degree and annual pattern for IInd & IIIrd year degree as prescribed by the affiliating university and the students are evaluated as a part of summative evaluation approach on the basis of performance in the examinations.

Graduate attributes have the potential to outlast the knowledge and contexts in which they were originally acquired.

- The affiliating university facilities students for redressal of their grievances regarding evaluation. The students apply for re-totaling and revaluation of their answer scripts by paying the prescribed fee and the application is processed through principal of the college to the university.
- Grievances and suggestions box was placed in the college premises.
- Mechanism for redressal of grievances in internal examinations is put in place in the department concerned.

2.6 Student performance and Learning outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the college has clearly stated outcomes which are a result of programmes offered. Due importance is given to student learning outcomes such as accumulated knowledge, skills and attitudes which the student is expected to develop during the course of study i.e.B.A/B.Com/B.Sc. At a meeting of the freshers convened by the principal in the presence of faculty members the students are counseled to achieve the learning outcomes. The objective is that they go out of the campus after completing the course as a finished product useful to themselves and the society at large. The students are told that the skills acquired by them in the laboratories could be useful to work in any establishment/industry/laboratory concerning the subject taught in and learned in the institution. With regard to attitude outcomes the students are advised to develop openness to religion and philosophy of different cultures.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

- The annual academic plan and institutional plan is prepared at the beginning of the academic year, in addition to the lecturer wise lesson plan.
- The institute encourages faculty to use OHP, LCD projector in teaching– learning process.
- Using previous question papers and question bank for reinforce learning in the class room.
- Each teacher is kept in-charge of a class to look into the academic matter.
- Providing tutorial and remedial support to slow learners.
- Students are encouraged to participate in the class room seminars.
- Study material on important topics is made available to the students.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student's placement, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.,) of the courses offered?

The BA, B.Sc and, B.Com courses being offered will have economic and social relevance. Sensing the needs of the students in the present scenario suitable changes in the curriculum with skill orientation are suggested by the members of board of studies.

The JKC & career guidance cell incorporate various programmes to hone employable skills, entrepreneurship etc. among the students. Departments such as Zoology, Sanskrit, Commerce etc. involve students in study projects.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

- The institute collects analyses data on students learning out comes and make use of it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning by identifying the performance of the students in home test, term examinations and pre-final examinations. Slow learners are identified by internal assessment and remedial Coaching is provided for them in a systematic way so as to overcome the barriers of learning.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

- The performance of the students maintained throughout the academic year by conducting different activities like assignments, class tests, seminars and prefinal examinations.
- The scripts are evaluated and marks communicated to the students and posted in the marks register by lecturers.
- Evaluation is making a tool of motivation for learning and it promotes rapport between the student and teacher.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, The learning levels as well as academic performance at various levels, theory / practicals / co-curricular / extracurricular, is evaluated using the evaluation outcomes of the students. Students belonging to rural agricultural families who do not have academic environment in their habitations are identified using assessment / evaluation and given counseling by personal interaction by the teachers to overcome any specific problems and to improve levels of comprehension with the help of teaching aids. Books are suggested for easy understanding. The help of fast learners is also suggested. The details of remedial Coaching provided are documented by the departments concerned.

Any other relevant information regarding teaching, learning and evaluation which the college would like to include

At the undergraduate level the college offers many options to the students in various programmes, BA/B.Sc/B.Com. Keeping pace with the developments in various areas of study information accrued from different text books / reference books / internet even going beyond the curriculum is passed on to the students during class room lectures with a view to enrich the curriculum. Social skills which facilitate interaction and communication with others are developed among the students by way of counseling at various functions organized in the college and also training classes of JKC. Students are warned about impairment of social skills due to bad habits.

Students are sensitized on broad skills such as communications, human relations, leadership, management & organization, planning & research and work survival.

Teaching plan prepared by the faculty is brought to the notice of the students in advance. Internet is used as a learning resource. Students are motivated to use ICT beyond the class room as internet is a treasure house of knowledge.

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

At present, there is no recognized research centre in the college. However the Govt. of Andhra Pradesh has identified our institution as a resource centre in Aquaculture. Accordingly **Dr.P.Saibaba of Zoology Dept.** was selected by Govt. of Andhra Pradesh as **a member in three members Aquaculture Expert Committee** and sent to Punjab for the development of aquaculture in Punjab state on the request of Hon'ble Chief Minister of Punjab Shri.Prakash Singh Badalji during August 2014. The other two members in the expert committee are Dr.T.V. Ramana, Dean (Fisheries), S.V. Veterinary University, Tirupati and Dr. R. Rama Krishna, Senior Scientist (Aquaculture) Retd, from the same university. The Expert Committee submitted a report with necessary suggestions for the development of aquaculture in Punjab to the Govt. of Punjab state. Besides this, several faculty members are actively involved in research activities.



The research committee has made some important recommendations for the promotion of research in the college as given below:

Recommendations of Research Committee:

- Staff members are to be encouraged to take up research programmes for M.Phil and Ph.D.
- Doctorate faculty members are to be advised to submit proposals for minor and major research projects to various funding agencies like UGC, DBT etc.
- Faculty members are to be encouraged to publish research articles in journals.
- Staff members are to be identified and encouraged to conduct seminars and workshops in the college.
- Staff and students are to be encouraged to participate in seminars and workshops conducted by other institutions.

Impact of the Recommendations of Research Committee:

- At present, among 22 aided lecturers, 12 (**54.5% of Aided faculty**) have **Ph. D** degree and 5 (**22.7% of Aided faculty**) are holding **M.Phil** degree while among the unaided lecturers, 3 are Ph.D degree holders and 6 have

M.Phil degree. During the last eight years **(Post Accreditation period)** 12 faculty members have received **Ph. D** degree and 6 have received **M.Phil** degree. Currently 4 faculty members are engaged in Ph.D research under the XI & XIIth plan of Faculty Development Programme. Apart from this 7 lecturers are pursuing Ph.D degree and one teacher for M.Phil on part-time basis.

- The college has received two Major Research Projects and two Minor Research Projects funded by UGC. Some of the staff members have applied/completed/continuing research projects.
- A number of teachers have published research articles in reputed journals. The faculty of Zoology Dept. has been publishing research findings frequently on Aquaculture in local magazines and other public media for the immediate benefit of farmers.
- Conducted 5 National level seminars organized by the Dept. of Commerce, Chemistry & Biochemistry, English, Botany, and Physics & Electronics and 1 workshop by IQAC.
- Faculty members of the college have participated and presented papers in various seminars and workshops.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

• Autonomy to the Principal Investigator (PI)

The college provides full autonomy to the Principal Investigator of minor and major projects to facilitate smooth progress and completion of proposed research work in time.

• Timely Availability or Release of Resources

As soon as grants are received from the funding agency, a separate bank account is opened in the name of Principal Investigator for the timely availability of resources. The principal investigator will be given full freedom for utilizing the funds. He is responsible for auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding agencies through the principal of the college.

• Adequate infrastructure and human resources

The college provides laboratory, library and computer facilities to the researchers as and when required. All science departments have sufficient laboratory facilities and instruments for the execution of research work. The college also extends administrative and technical support to the research faculty.

- **Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers**

Study leave and duty leave are granted for eligible teachers.

- **Support in terms of technology and information needs**

The college has good number of computers with internet facility in almost all the departments. The library is also provided with reprographic facility and internet connectivity. The staff members are allowed to use the laboratories, instruments, and library and internet facility for their research work.

- **Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities**

During the course of research project, periodic monitoring is done by the principal of the college. The progress reports are forwarded to the funding agencies through the principal. After completion of the research project an audit is conducted and utilization certificate will be submitted to the funding agencies through the principal of the college.

- **Any other**

The college provides necessary facilities and infrastructure to the faculty for implementation of research activities.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution always motivates the staff and students to actively involve in research activities for improving knowledge and skill in their respective fields. The guest lectures, seminars and workshops conducted in the college motivate the staff and students to involve in research activities. The students are encouraged for paper presentation in seminars. The science department's conducts short field visits to nearby research stations and laboratories for students. The students of the college do research projects as a part of their course syllabi. All these activities develop scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among the students.

3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (Guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual/collaborative research activity, etc.)

The faculty members of the college are actively involved in research activities. The details are as follows:

a) Faculty involvement in guiding student research:

As our college is mainly intended for teaching and learning process for undergraduate students there are no student research scholars registered for research degrees (M.Phil/Ph.D) and the members of the faculty are not acting as research guides for the student research. However the college is making all possible efforts to develop scientific temper and research culture among the students through the following initiatives:

- By conducting short field trips to research labs and shrimp culture farms to inculcate research aptitude among the students.
- By arranging guest lectures, seminars and workshops to provide ample opportunities to students to interact with eminent researchers.
- By making availability of research books, journals, articles and paper clippings of research importance in the library.
- By guiding student projects.

b) Faculty members leading Research Projects:**Major Research Projects (UGC):****Dr. P.S Reddy, Head of the Dept. of Telugu (Retd)**

- Completed a Major Research Project titled “A Comparative Study of Trendsetters in the Evolution of Telugu Film Lyric” with a financial assistance of Rs.6, 52,556/- from UGC during 2006-08 and got “**Nandi Award**”, **Highest Award for Excellence in Telugu Cinema** presented annually by the Government of Andhra Pradesh.
- Doing a Major Research Project titled “A Study of Dubbing Songs in Telugu Films and their Literary Values” with a financial assistance of Rs.9, 30,800/-from UGC during 2013-15.

He has surveyed the common diseases of fish and shrimp in culture systems of Konaseema region, a highly potential area for aquaculture, with self funding for the benefit of aqua farmers. Our college always aims to boost academic standards of both staff and students. For this purpose the college invites eminent academicians, subject experts and researchers as resource persons for the seminars and workshops and creates an opportunity to the staff and students to interact with them.

IQAC of the college is frequently organizing lectures and inviting eminent resource persons to address the teaching staff and students for the improvement of 'quality' in higher education. The details of the events are given in the Department Evaluative Reports.

There is no provision for the staff to utilize sabbatical leave for research activities. However staff members can avail leave for two years for Ph.D and one year for M.Phil degree as per UGC regulations under FDP scheme. On duty leave will be sanctioned to faculty participating in seminars and workshops. All faculty members should complete one orientation and two

3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land).

- Faculty members of Zoology Dept. are actively involved in creating scientific awareness among the aqua farmers for the development of sustainable aquaculture. Dr.P.Saibaba of Zoology Dept. acts as resource person in aquaculture activities for academic colleges, research institutes and public meetings. He is transferring relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere in the field of Aquaculture to the aqua farmers through local magazines, print and electronic media and making all possible efforts to fill the gap between activities of scientists (lab) and farmers (land). Recently Dr. P. Saibaba has alerted the aquafarmers on the emergence and impact of a new microsporidian disease, EHP through T.V channel.
- Dr.P.Saibaba made some recommendations to the Govt. of Punjab for the development of aquaculture through the report submitted by A.P Aquaculture Expert Committee.
- The department of Botany is maintaining vermicompost unit in the institution and creating awareness among the farmers on the utility and importance of organic fertilizers in agriculture, especially in horticulture.
- Some of the faculty members of the departments like Chemistry, Commerce and Telugu have undertaken research projects and create research awareness among the students and also enlighten the society on environmental and social issues.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

There is no provision for allotment of fund for research in the college. But the fund is mobilized for the research activities from UGC and other Governmental agencies by the individual researcher and the college provides necessary help.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

There is no such provision in the college to provide seed money to the faculty for research. However the college provides other facilities like infrastructure, laboratory and library to researchers to complete the research work.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

For the student research projects there is no provision in the college to provide financial assistance. But the student research projects do not suffer due to lack of financial provisions and are carried out by individual efforts of the students. Students are encouraged to take up some research projects under the supervision of senior faculty members and the infrastructure is made available.

3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

Organization of seminars in the college is also a part of research activity. The faculty members appointed in various committees, drawn from different departments of the college, work together for the successful organization of seminars and workshops, as a part of research activity. Some of the departments of the institution like Botany and Biotechnology; Chemistry and Biochemistry; and Physics and Electronics have jointly organized seminars as an inter-disciplinary research activity.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

Internet facility with Wi-Fi connection is provided to all departments. Computers with internet connectivity are made available to researchers. Infrastructure facilities and accommodation are provided to the research faculty. Specialized labs are developed for research alone in some of the science departments. Most modern equipments like spectrophotometers, Electrophoresis, PCRs and Cooling Centrifuges are made available for research faculty. All these facilities are made available to staff for their research work. The Zoological museum provides another such opportunity wherein staff and students of other departments can improve their knowledge of Zoology by visiting museum.

3.2.6 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'yes' give details.

No, the institution has not received any special grants either from the affiliating university or any other beneficiary agency for developing research facility. The research facilities are created with the funds received from the funding agencies for the research projects and also by the college.

3.3 Research Facilities**3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?**

Wi-Fi facility is available on the campus and most of the departments in the college are provided with internet connection. Some labs are earmarked as research labs by some of the science departments. Most modern equipments like Spectrophotometers, Electrophoresis, PCRs and Cooling Centrifuges are made available for research activity. General library equipped with internet and reprographic facility. Researchers can make use of all these facilities.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The grant received from the UGC and other funding agencies is used to purchase books and journals, equipments and other relevant materials for research activities as per the guidelines of funding agencies. Laboratories of science departments are well maintained and well equipped to facilitate research. Faculty members can use other department laboratories for the research work as and when required. The laboratories of Botany and Zoology departments are provided with most modern equipments like Research Microscopes, Spectrophotometers, Laminar flow hoods, Electrophoresis, PCR and Cooling Centrifuges for research faculty. The college encourages all the staff members to organize and to attend seminars to improve the knowledge in the new and emerging areas of research interest.

3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If 'yes', what are the instruments/ facilities created during the last four years?

The college has not received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities. The research facilities are created with the funds received from the funding agencies for the research projects and also by the college.

3.3.4 What are the research facilities made available to the students and research scholars outside the campus / other research laboratories?

Some of the researchers of the college utilize the research facilities available outside the campus like Agricultural Research Station at Ambajipeta and other research laboratories of universities for their research activities.

The Dept. of Zoology is utilizing the research facilities available in a Private Aqua Disease Diagnostic Laboratory subsidized by MPEDA, M/s. Sapthagiri Aqua Labs at Amalapuram for the disease diagnosis of aquatic animals and for other research activities related to aquaculture.

3.3.5 Provide details on the library/ information resource centre or any other facilities available specifically for the researchers?

The general library of the college has sufficient facilities to act as an information resource center. It has good collection of books, journals/magazines related to all subjects, printing, reprographic and internet facilities. These facilities are made available to all the research faculty of the college.

3.3.6 What are the collaborative research facilities developed / created by the research institutes in the college. For ex. Laboratories, library, instruments, computers, new technology etc.

Available references in the library, instruments in the labs and knowledge of faculty are used for collaborative research.

The Dept. of Biotechnology is equipped with latest instruments like PCR, Electrophoresis etc., which can be utilized for collaborative research by the other research faculty of Biology departments. The staff members of Dept. of Mathematics are helping the research faculty in the interpretation of statistical data related to their research work. Dr.P.Saibaba of Zoology dept. has utilized

the services of Botany faculty for identification of plankton, Chemistry faculty for water analysis of aquaculture ponds and Mathematics faculty for statistical analysis of research data while pursuing his Ph.D degree.

3.4 Research Publications and Awards

3.4.1 Highlight the major research achievements of the staff and students in terms of

- **Patents obtained and filed (process and product)**
 - At present no patents are obtained and filed. However Dr. P. Saibaba of Zoology Department has completed his work on “Loose Shell Syndrome/White Feces Syndrome” in shrimp culture and he will be developing a product very soon to control it.
- **Original research contributing to product improvement**
 - A study is being carried out by Dr. P. Saibaba of Dept. of Zoology to find the causes of an economically important disease “Moulting Mortality Syndrome (MMS)” in vannamei shrimp culture and to develop preventive measures.
- **Research studies or surveys benefiting the community or improving the services**
 - Dr.P. Saibaba of Dept of Zoology has visited Punjab state during 10th to 18th August 2014 as **a member of three members A.P. Aquaculture Expert Committee** constituted by Govt. of A.P on the request from Hon’ble Chief Minister of Punjab, Shri Prakash Singh Badal, for the development of aquaculture in Punjab state. The committee paid a **special attention for the development of aquaculture in water logged areas in five districts, where agriculture of any kind is not possible.** The problem of water logging is more severe in the districts of Western Punjab i.e., Shri Muktsar Sahib, Faridkot, Firozpur, Fazilka and Bhatinda districts. **A detailed report consisting of about 78 pages was prepared** and submitted to both the Governments of Andhra Pradesh and Punjab.
 - Dr.P.Saibaba of Zoology department has surveyed economically important diseases in fish, prawn and shrimp culture ponds of Konaseema region of East Godavari District in Andhra Pradesh. He published the details of his findings and suggestions in aqua magazines and news papers along with short TV programmes for the immediate benefit of Aqua farming community. He has been contributing a lot of information with his research activity for the

development of sustainable aquaculture at both state and national level. He is actively involved in answering the questions posted by aqua farmers and technicians on Aquaculture through a mobile app managed by “Aqua Brahma” regularly at national level.

- A few surveys conducted by the students especially on blood groups have been benefiting the community in many ways.

- **Research inputs contributing to new initiatives and social Development**

The research activities undertaken by the faculty of college are primarily oriented towards enrichment of subject knowledge and community development. Some of the important contributions are:

- The research work carried out by Dr.Pydipala on Telugu Cinema and the publication of books by Dr.S.R.S Kolluri and Smt.K.Padmaja of Telugu department help to enrich the Telugu literature.
- Dr. A.Venkateswara Rao of Chemistry department has enlightened the impact of oil and gas exploration activities on the environment in Konaseema region of E.G District through his research contributions.
- Better protocols of egg washing developed by Dr.P.Saibaba helped the shrimp hatcheries to improve seed quality of shrimp. Seed selection criteria developed by Dr.P.Saibaba helped the aqua farmers to choose good quality shrimp seed. An innovative study carried out by Dr. P.Saibaba on viral antagonism between MBV and HPV (viral pathogens) in Tiger Shrimp opened the way for the design of practical strategies to control viral diseases and other pathogens in shrimp culture.

The institution follows the following systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface:

- The faculty of Zoology department is frequently participating in various aquaculture related activities organized by state government and private organizations as a resource person to establish institute and industry interface.
- The experts from the industry and corporate companies visit the institution and interact with the students in order to enlighten them about various job opportunities.
- The JKC of the college organises job recruitments in which different companies are invited for the recruitment of students as per their requirement.
- The college organizes several industrial and field visits to students to give them an exposure of practical experience and knowledge in their field of study.
- The dept. of Botany is maintaining vermicompost unit and enlighten the farmers about the importance of organic fertilizers in agriculture and horticulture.

The faculty members are given freedom to engage consultancy services for the benefit of society and they offer free consultancy services through their own initiatives receiving indirect benefit to the students. The institution allows its faculty to use the available facilities to promote consultancy. The expertise available for consultancy is publicized through participation and presentation of papers in seminars and public meetings, publication of articles in journals and vernacular magazines and delivering guest lectures in other institutes.

- As paper setters and external examiners.
- As resource persons at various seminars and other events.

The consultancy services are not for generating income, but offering as a social service to various government agencies, academic institutions, private organizations and aqua farmers. Hence there is no sharing of income generated through consultancy and its use for institutional development. However voluntary contributions in the form of chemicals, test kits and other items from outside consultations are utilized for the development of research facilities in the college.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The ambience in which an employee functions affects the productivity of any institution. For an institution of higher learning infrastructural facilities and access to learning resources are necessary for meaningful knowledge transfer and creation. The college takes systematic steps to make sure that constant updating takes place in this front.

4.1 Physical Facilities**4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?****Adequate availability and optimal utilization of Infrastructure:**

A clear cut policy has been laid down by the college Management right from the establishment of the college to create and enhance the infrastructure in all the departments and the administrative block to facilitate teaching and learning on sound lines.

Effective measures such as a computer with internet, LCD Projectors power point, OHP, e-class rooms, teaching aids such as CDs, videos are taken to ensure effective teaching & learning incorporating demonstrations.

All the head of departments, co-ordinators of various committees and supervisors submit their infrastructural requirements and proposals for the forthcoming year in March itself prior to the preparation of budget for the next academic year.

The institution is endowed with excellent physical infrastructural facilities which include the administrative block, 42 adequate class rooms, laboratories, staff rooms, separate seminar halls, auditorium, playground, gymnasium and central library for both under graduate and post graduate students. The college has made systematic efforts to upgrade its infrastructural facilities and to keep pace with new, supplementary and replacement demands. The time table committee plans ahead for all requirements regarding classrooms, laboratories, furniture and other equipments. This ensures that the college management has sufficient time to acquire and replace some of the outdated provisions by the start of every academic year.

Every year the college management also reviews the condition of computers in various laboratories and replaces the obsolete systems and services with new ones. Infrastructural facilities such as furniture and air conditioners in laboratories are replaced and augmented as the need arises. The institution has

appointed one supervisor, one electrician cum plumber and a hardware technician for maintenance of the facilities.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- a) Curricular and co-curricular activities – classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.**
- b) Extra –curricular activities – Sports, outdoor and indoor Games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.**

Creation and Enhancement of Infrastructure:

The policy of the college is to upgrade and enhance infrastructural facilities to meet the growing needs of the college in the teaching learning process deriving benefits that would deliver better value for money, enhanced quality services, reduction in duplication of work and increase in efficiency.

It has been the constant endeavour of the management to create and enhance infrastructure of the college. In the post accreditation period the following new infrastructure facilities have been created.

1. New equipment and instruments for science labs.
2. Computer systems with internet and Wi-Fi to most of the departments.
3. Water coolers, reprographic facility, dining halls, adequate drinking water facility, etc., provided.
4. New bank building was constructed. A spacious canteen facility is under construction.
5. LCD projectors are available in most of the departments.

Adequate number of class rooms and laboratories are provided for running all courses. All departments are having staff rooms with required furniture.

A separate staff room is provided for women staff members. An administrative building is provided for the principal's chamber, establishment and office administration that has fully computerized and Wi-Fi enabled internet connectivity with desktop and intercom facility.

The college makes optimal utilization of the two auditoriums (one is open air auditorium). These are used as multipurpose utilities for yoga classes, examinations, college programmes, parent teacher meetings, alumni meetings and various other events. A photo copy centre situated in a room adjoining

Dr.Ambedkar Open University Study Centre is used by the students at subsidized charges.

Competitive examinations like APPSC, Bank Examinations, Type Examinations and various common entrance tests like EAMCET, AUCET, ICET, EdCET, ECET examinations were conducted in our college making use of the infrastructure facilities available.

Our college has been selected as a regional coordination centre for evaluation of theory papers and also to conduct practical examinations for about 20 neighbouring degree colleges affiliated to the university every year.

NCC camps and inter-collegiate Sports events are organised in this college.

On several occasions of natural calamities like floods, cyclones, blow-outs etc, our college is used as a rehabilitation centre. For all major elections, our college is used as a distribution centre as well as counting centre to this division.

Our college offered venue for various meetings and seminars held under the auspices of voluntary organizations such as Lions club, Rotary club, Walker club, Janavignana vedika and old students association meetings etc.

A) Curricular Activities

The college has been enhancing audio visual resources in the past few years. Some departments possess mobile LCD projectors with suitable accessories to ensure that ICT enabled teaching resources are used more frequently. OHP is also available to meet the needs of the students.

The college has established an exclusive multimedia laboratory/ English laboratory for the creation of e-content resources.

The science laboratories are well equipped to cater to the UG students. The following laboratories are very much in demand and cater to the special needs of the student body namely Language laboratory, Computer laboratories, Chemistry laboratory, Physics laboratory, Botany laboratory and Zoology museum and laboratories, Bio-technology laboratory.

The college is continually updating its automation facilities, which will soon be a complete data base of all college information to facilitate retrieval and usage for administrative and academic purposes. e-filing and e-databases have ensured that the sustainable documentation of all college information is possible.

- Recently the open air auditorium has reconstructed with all facilities with the contribution of alumni association.
- Purified drinking water plant(RO System) has been established in a separate room and operates throughout working hours.
- The college has installed solar energy system for street lighting to minimize power consumption.
- All the laboratories are well equipped to carry out the prescribed curriculum.
- Separate accommodation for all the departments with computers, printers, scanner and wi-fi facility.
- The college has provided English language laboratory and Jawahar Knowledge Centre (JKC) with 03 computers to train students in computer skills.
- Installed the sound system in all class rooms connected with principal office to play National Anthem, “Vandemataram” and to convey any information to the students.
- A photocopy machine and a duplicating machine provided for conducting various intramural examinations
- The institution has its own website : www.skbrcollege.org

Separate volley ball and shuttle courts are availed for staff recreation in the college campus.

The academic committee gives suggestions to the departments in the matter of utilizing the available infrastructure such as computer systems, equipment, instruments and teaching aids. The objective of the suggestions is to fully utilize the infrastructure in a way to strengthen the teaching – learning process and contribute to the academic growth of the students keeping in view the horizontal and vertical mobility of the course concerned.

- Faculty to use the computers with internet facility to search for additional and latest information on the topics being taught.
- To use the printer to take print outs of certain topics to be delivered to the students.
- To use the LCD projectors for power point presentation of some topics whenever necessary.
- To make use of CDs and videos for effective teaching.
- To fully utilize the laboratory facilities for practicals and also for taking some student projects.
- To use the chemicals and the equipment for consultancy services free of cost.

- Accommodation is provided for the conduct of public activities such as general elections, counting centers, strong rooms for keeping ballot boxes, for organizing university level and zonal level Sports and Games.
- It has study centres of Dr.B.R.Ambedkar's Open University and Andhra University School of Distance Education and conducts classes in the college on Saturdays and Sundays as per the schedule.

The library is optimally utilized by extending the working hours from 8.30 am to 6.00 pm.

Residential Facilities

Most of the students are coming from nearby villages and they are utilizing the APSRTC bus pass facility at concessional rates. Meanwhile some SC and ST boy students are staying in two social welfare college boys hostels under the aegis of social welfare department. One women's hostel was constructed in the college campus. It is just within 100 meters distance from the college library and laboratories.

Health Related Support Services:

The college takes special care to ensure the health and well-being of its students. The college health centre has a medical practitioner, who visits the centre off and on and is available for emergencies. For all students there is a specially designed medical fitness form, the submission of which is mandatory from this academic year at the time of admission. This form focuses on health related information including the medical history of the student. The health

centre attends to any medical complaint, maintaining an arrangement with nearby hospitals and responds to any health emergencies. Student insurance scheme has been initiated for all the students on the campus. First aid box is also available on the campus.

The college management has also special concern on the health of its women staff members to provide special, maternity and fraternity leaves on medical ground as per the government norms. Maternity leave with pay is guaranteed for staff. Female ANM attends to the issues related to women students. Govt. ambulance services (toll free no.108 and 104) are available when the emergency arises. The institution gives top priority for sanitation.

- Two vehicle stands for students and two for staff vehicles are available on the campus.
- A canteen facility is available for the students and staff
- A nationalized bank branch (Andhra Bank) is available for the students, staff and public.
- Refrigerators are also provided in some departments.
- Drinking water facility is available for staff and students.
- Open air auditorium is available for conducting meetings and cultural activities.
- Construction of indoor stadium is under progress with all facilities.
- Necessary proposals were submitted to UGC and the Govt. under various schemes for construction of additional class rooms, toilets and other renovation works to the dilapidated building.

The library committee is an advisory body which approves the budget allocations for the purchase of books, journals, magazines and reference books. By taking into consideration the resolutions of the meeting, the committee arranges to provide facilities and appropriate measures are taken to place orders for new and latest editions and volumes and issuing them to the students on time. “Pick up the volume at choice” is implemented through which, students are given freedom to feel the physical access of the book shelves to select a book of their choice.

The library responds immediately to the change of syllabus and suggestions of the staff of the teaching faculty for the purchase of new books. The reference section and general reading enclosure are kept open to all library visitors from morning to evening.

News papers, journals, periodicals, magazines etc., are subscribed and kept in the magazine display shelves for easy access.

The library maintains user-friendly approach and creates very conducive environment for learning. As many as 50 iron racks have been purchased with UGC additional assistance grants. For custody of books, on the recommendations of the library committee, four C.C.cameras have been

provided in the central library under the UGC XII Plan grants .One water cooler has been provided in the central library for students/staff.

- Planning to have national knowledge network connectivity through Adikavi Nannayya University, Rajahmundry.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching - learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

Some of the students are fast learners and have picked up computer skills so well that they render the role of a facilitator for the teacher. Mr.Bokka Pavan Kalyan and Mr. Nakka Hari Sai of II B.Sc M.P Computers (2014-15) help the teacher while delivering power point presentation in the class room.

The college administration is aware that the National Knowledge Network (NKN) which interconnects all institutions of higher learning facilities knowledge sharing and collaborative research in such a way that will bridge the knowledge gap in the country. 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

Institutional mechanisms are kept active for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure facilities and equipment of the college. There is a team of full-time works supervisor, hardware technician, electrician cum plumber, carpenter, generator operator, gardener and others to continuously look after the maintenance and upkeep of the facilities besides the equipment. Whenever necessary the services of the external technicians are also called for.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

The calibration and other precision measures for the equipment / instruments are taken care of by the college in a systematic manner. The college has a team of qualified technical staff for maintenance, calibration and other precision measures for equipments / instruments. Some of the technicians are available on the campus and their services are availed on a full time basis.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

- The college is having drinking water supply from Peruru Grama Panchayat and Amalapuram Municipality. In addition we have RO plant also for supply of pure drinking water in the college. All problems such as voltage fluctuations, damages of water pipe lines etc., are promptly attended to by the works supervisor and other technicians on duty.
- The department of APTRANSCO has replaced the electrical poles for power line and planning to install additional transformer to avoid power fluctuations. To maintain proper voltage additional generator of 15 kv was purchased. Sheds have been constructed for keeping these equipments.
- All the science departments are provided with high backup tubular batteries with inverters to maintain sensitive equipment.
- CC cameras have been installed at the central library, RO plant, students vehicle stand, open air auditorium etc.
- Besides availing the services of the college staff , outside technical experts are called by the institution for necessary repairs/ maintenance of sensitive equipments, whenever the need arises.

Any other relevant information regarding infrastructure and learning resources which the college would like to include

Development and maintenance of infrastructure are given due importance by the college Management. All basic needs such as safe drinking water, sanitation, electricity, canteen etc are provided. Science laboratories are equipped with required equipment such as PCR, Spectrophotometer, P^H meter, DO meter, electrophoresis, photocell for determination of plank's constant, cathode-ray tube etc.

Special attention is paid to college library as a learning resource. Text books / Reference books are acquired in sufficient numbers to cater to the needs of the students to cope with the changes in curriculum. Magazines / Journals / Periodicals are also available for students who are preparing for competitive examinations and interviews.



6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

Addressing the needs of the society

In enumerating the institutional distinctive characteristics - in terms of addressing the needs of the society, students are sensitized about their social responsibilities and duties. For example, sensing the increasing incidence of malaria and dengue, in the surrounding locality, a drive on malaria and dengue awareness and their prevention was carried out by distributing printed informative pamphlets. In order to draw attention towards the environmental hazardous, students organized rallies and distributed pamphlets highlighting this issue. Health, dental and eye check up camps were held. The college arranged a visit to - orphanage, and distributed bed sheets, fruits and food items. The college aims to widen social responsibility of the students by conducting educational workshops and awareness camps that would benefit the various sections of the society. For instance, NSS Units I and II organised blood donation camp on 5th Dec 2014 on college campus. As many as 160 volunteers donated blood.

Addressing the needs of the students

The college has a clearly defined plan of action chalked out by IQAC at the beginning of every academic year with the mission of the college in mind. The college envisions admitting students from all sections of the society and grooming them as higher education learners, besides inculcating human values and moulding them as responsible citizens. In order to explore and develop the innate talents of the students, the institution imparts better academic and employable skills. At the beginning of the academic year, the students are given orientation about the forthcoming activities and information about the academic schedule. The college has various committees and clubs which carry out different activities to hone the skills and knowledge of the students in various fields. Career conferences were organised by JKC to promote soft skills and hard skills. Students' performance is monitored by the teacher counsellors. Keeping in line with the need for value orientation among the students, the IQAC periodically interacts with various committees to formulate plans aligning with the mission of the college.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

Role of the Top management

- All the aided colleges come under the purview of the department of collegiate education which is one of the two branches of higher education, Govt. of Andhra Pradesh.
- The Commissioner, Collegiate Education, A.P., Hyderabad communicates duties and responsibilities of staff through the principal and looks after the administrative & financial matters of the institutions in the State.

- The office of the Commissionerate, Collegiate Education communicates the academic calendar which consists of the academic and administrative activities of the institutions to be implemented.
- The Adikavi Nannaya University, Rajahmundry supplies academic calendar well in advance in the beginning of the academic year.
- The Regional Joint Director, Collegiate Education, Rajahmundry looks after the administrative setup of the institution in the entire region.
- The District Identified (Lead) College receives and consolidates the entire information of the colleges and communicates the same to the authorities.
- All policy matters and matters involving finance are referred to the management for instructions.

Role of the Principal

- The principal is the administrative head of the institution to govern the institution as per the rules and regulations framed by the Government, Universities and Management.
- The principal provides academic leadership involves and guides the faculties in various academic activities of the college, thus ensuring accountability and empowerment.
- The principal also ensures interaction with all the stakeholders' viz., parents, industry experts, academicians and alumni.
- The principal receives feedback from the faculty and students.
- The principal also interacts with the NGOs and local community members to enlist their support for various academic activities, curricular as well as extracurricular.
- The principal constitutes various committees for smooth administration.
- The working of these committees along with IQAC ensures the design and implementation of quality policies and plans.
- The academic time table of the institution is circulated among the faculty, students and also displayed on the notice board.
- The action plan of the college is prepared based on the university academic calendar.
- The principal acts as the liaison officer between government and the management, management and staff, staff and students besides college and community.

Role of the Faculty

- Teachers are the foundation for ensuring the implementation of quality policies and its practices.
- The teachers of this college have imbibed the spirit of imparting the qualitative education.
- Teachers are self-motivated and take initiative to bring in innovative teaching practices, involving student-centric modules.
- Teachers take a proactive role in updating themselves with the latest trends in their domain, and ensure that the students are moulded in all-round development to face the current challenges.
- Teachers motivate and provide the necessary guidance to the students in all curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Teachers actively participate in decisions pertaining to the policies of the college, by being the conveners of various committees and clubs.
- Each department conducts a departmental meeting and prepares the academic schedule for the academic year.
- Annual lesson plan is prepared by the departments concerned.
- Teaching synopsis and diaries are prepared by the teachers concerned.
- In-charges of the departments conduct departmental meetings to receive the feedback as per the academic plan.
- Attendance of the students is taken regularly.
- After receiving the feedback and suggestions from the departments, there is thread bare discussions in the IQAC meeting for its implementation.
- List of class-wise absentees is displayed on the notice board and the Parents/Guardians are informed regularly.
- Slow learners are bestowed special attention.
- Teacher guide the students regarding text books, reference books and related websites for their academic growth.

6.1.3 What is the role of the leadership in ensuring?

- **The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission**

The principal ensures that there is a free and fair working environment for the staff, aimed at overall development.

Leadership is the key factor responsible for the success of an organization. Effective leadership is the challenge that ensures success. As, head of the institution, the principal looks after the academic & administrative affairs of the college by maintaining cordial relationship with the staff and students.

The principal is responsible for the day-to-day administrative activities of the college. The principal, vice principal, in-charges of the departments and all the

staff members work together as a team towards fulfilling the mission plans. Role and responsibilities of each staff member are defined during the IQAC meeting. Staff members lead various committees for proper working of the systems devised to ensure quality. In order to initiate and chalk out future actions aligning with the mission of the college, periodical meetings are conducted with all the stakeholders and feedback is taken.

- **Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan**

The principal is the administrative head of the college. However, certain administrative functions are delegated to the vice-principal. The convener of the IQAC monitors the functioning of various committees by holding meetings and discussions periodically. The feedback taken from students, staff, alumni, parents, industry and other experts is sent to various committees to formulate future action plan in consultation with the IQAC. These plans are incorporated and implemented in the functioning of various committees and clubs.

- **Interaction with stakeholders**

The systems and policies of the college ensure an interactive platform with all the stakeholders in various events. The parent-teacher meet, alumni meet, student council meet and committee meetings with the IQAC ensure that the principal involves and interacts with all the stakeholders.

- **Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders**

The principal conducts a meeting with all staff members at the beginning of an academic year, to discuss the activities to be conducted. Faculty members act as conveners for various academic, extracurricular and co-curricular activities. These meetings ensure the progress of activities of committees and appropriate actions. Principal holds meetings with students and teachers for discussing various issues to ensure smooth and successful conduct of the events. After each event there is a review by the principal with the convener. The principal ensures that adequate information gathered during the regular staff meetings, various committee meetings and IQAC meetings is communicated to the stakeholders during subsequent meetings.

- **Reinforcing the culture of excellence**

The leadership stresses constantly in various forms about the need for excellence and holistic development of the institution. The IQAC of the institution reinforces the culture of excellence. The academic calendar helps the faculty and students to prepare themselves for various activities well in advance. Students are taken for field visits. The final year students share their experiences during freshers' day, which benefit the junior students.

- **Champion organizational change**

Based on the feedback from various stakeholders, the leadership will make necessary organizational change for the overall benefit of the institution.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The IQAC plays a crucial role by routinely interacting with each committee member; to monitor, discuss and evaluate the outcome of the quality policies adopted. For the purpose of effective implementation and improvement in the policy, suggestions are elicited from the stakeholders during the routine meetings, based on which the Principal along with the staff drafts out an action plan. The minutes of the parent-teacher meeting are discussed and future directives are chalked out. The principal is called for various meetings with the Governing Body whenever needed. An audit committee nominated by CCE visits the college for conducting academic audit and evaluates policies and plans for effective implementation and improvement. An academic calendar is prepared at the beginning of every academic year based on the university academic calendar. The adherence of the activities to this calendar is monitored during monthly meetings of the principal with the staff. The preparation and documentation of the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) is taken up by IQAC. It ensures monitoring and evaluation of policies and plans of the institution and highlights the status of its implementation and throws light on areas that need further improvement. The principal visits all the departments to verify and assess the teaching activities. CPDC meetings are held to supervise and guide for effective implementation of the institutional plans.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The top management of the college i.e., Governing Body provides academic leadership to the faculty through the principal for carrying out their responsibilities and empowered them to take up academic initiatives. The higher officials / academic advisors of collegiate education visit the college now and then. The in-charges are responsible for their departmental activities. The principal encourages and empowers each teacher to plan his/her activities and facilitates a feeling of responsibility and leadership amongst the faculties. The principal convenes the staff council by involving all departmental in-charges and discusses various proposals. The potentialities of the staff members are well-utilized for the holistic development of the institution. The principal constitutes various academic committees and nominates the senior faculty as conveners for smooth functioning of the institution.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- The college facilitates an environment for involving and grooming leadership at all levels. The principal motivates all faculty members for overall academic growth and development of the college.
- The non-teaching staff works under the supervision of the principal in administrative matters. Focusing on the need to develop leadership spirit among the students, some are nominated to various committees such as Magazine committee, Library committee, IQAC, Special fees committee, Games committee, Anti-ragging committee etc.,.
- Staff representative acts as liaison between staff and management.
- Academic coordinator coordinates the academic activities under the overall supervision of the principal.
- Examination committee with senior member as convenor looks after the conduct of various examinations.
- UGC coordinator coordinates various activities of the UGC at college level and convenes regular meetings.
- NSS Coordinators of all the four units carry out the NSS activities
- NCC programme officers look after cadets training and NCC parades. Suitable guidance is provided to send the selected candidates to various camps.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The principal delegates operational autonomy and flexibility to all the departments. Each department is headed by an in-charge, who monitors the functioning of its activities. So, administration is decentralized for considerable improvement in the implementation of programmes. The principal and the in-charges of departments interact informally every day to ensure the smooth functioning of the college. Support is extended by college administration for any issues that need intervention and renewed motivation. As a systematic approach towards better administration, the principal constitutes various committees having senior faculty as convenor. Complete flexibility is given for the implementation of academic plans and other activities by the in-charge of each department, thus ensuring a decentralized system of administration.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management?

Yes, there is a culture of participative management at every level and each stage. In order to have better participation in all areas of the functioning of the college, non-teaching staff, student representatives, alumni and parents serve as the members of various committees.

They are intimated about the meetings well in advance. The policies and plans are framed after discussion and deliberations in the staff council. Suggestions of the staff are given due importance and decisions are taken on the basis of consensus. Actions taken based on the feedback are communicated to the stakeholder promptly, so as to spread a feeling of the importance that the college attaches to their stakeholders' view and participation. Staff representative on the Governing Body represents the grievances of staff and students at Governing Body meetings and plays a vital role in decision making.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?


Yes, the college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which has been established at the instance of NAAC. The feedback received from various stakeholders and the mission of the college to 'impart higher education to young men and women from the society and to develop human resources of excellence with ethics and social values to meet the needs of the country', eventually translates into the development of the policies towards enhancing quality. The growth and development of the institution can be measured based on the number of students going for higher learning in prestigious institutions and for employment. The quality policy is driven by ensuring participation of all the stakeholders in the upward progression in all areas of academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, of the various committees. The review of the quality policy is taken up during IQAC meetings for future progress of the institution.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan?

Yes, the College has a perspective plan for development, which begins with an informal communication across a cross-section of stakeholders including community leaders, academicians, faculty members, non-teaching staff, parents and students. The aspects considered for inclusion in the plan are: improve the admission process and enroll more students, hold more seminars / workshops exclusively for the students' participation, improve the communication skills by conducting extra classes on 'Communication Skills', construction of seminar hall, additional class rooms, waiting rooms with attached toilets for women staff and girl students, introducing of need-based certificate courses and enhancing employability skills.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

There is an internal organizational chart describing the hierarchy and the decision-making process. Each department has an in-charge, who monitors the functioning of the department. The institution has various committees with conveners. Decisions are made by the in-charge of the departments and conveners of the committees under the guidance of the principal, during the IQAC meeting and staff council. The internal organizational structure and decision making process is given in the following flow chart.



The college is a private aided college established in 1951 under society act. The Governing Body is elected by the general Body. The management of the college affairs is looked after by Governing Body comprising President, Secretary& Correspondent, Vice President, Treasurer and Members. The organisational structure and decision making process follow the flow chart.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

The following are the quality improvement strategies of the institution

• Teaching & Learning

Keeping in mind the emerging challenges in the field of higher education, the college believes in constant development and improvement of teaching and learning methodology. The faculty is encouraged to attend orientation and refresher courses to update the knowledge. ICT technology is used for class room teaching whenever needed by the teachers. Resource development centre is designed to help the teachers to develop their study materials. The speed of the modem was increased to facilitate faster and better accessibility to informational database.

Each teacher maintains a teaching diary to record the topics covered, methods used for each class, achievements, lesson plan, teaching plan etc., which is discussed and attested during the monthly meetings with the principal. Students are encouraged to participate in group discussions, student seminars, and projects for their better participatory learning. Field trips are conducted for students along with the faculty concerned to gain practical knowledge. Programmes are prepared for interactive sessions. Advanced, average and slow learners are identified and appropriate activities & measures are implemented for each group.

• Research & Development

At present the institution is having sixteen faculty members with Doctorate degrees and Sixteen with M. Phil degrees in various subjects. The institute encourages other faculty members to pursue Ph.D. The doctorate faculties are encouraged to send proposals to UGC for major & minor research projects. Publication of research articles; presentation of papers in seminars/conferences are also encouraged. As a result, ten faculty members have registered for Ph.D. and one for M. Phil in post accreditation period. The research activities are coordinated by the research committee. The students are encouraged to participate in the project works undertaken by the department.

- **Community engagement**

Various activities are organized by the NSS units of the college to orient students towards social problems and their role in becoming an excellent human resource. Different clubs of the college undertake community services as a part of their mainstream activities. A health checkup and dental/eye camp was held for the local residents and students. Awareness about ‘prevention of malaria & dengue’ and ‘ill-effects of plastic’ was created among the local residents by means of rally and pamphlets. At times of natural calamities such as cyclones and floods our college tenders service to the victims. In the aftermaths of ‘Hudhud cyclone’ our students took out rallies in the town to collect donations and an amount of Rs.2 lakhs was sent to CM relief fund.

- **Human resource management**

Staffing is made through recruiting and placement. The office of the college maintains a file of vacancies that arise in various departments in the institution. The vacancy particulars of the staff are submitted to the Governing Body to recruitment. A harmonious relationship is maintained between the staff and administration, which is an important factor in HR from this management. Apart from this, regular planning monitoring and evaluation are important for the success of the Human Resource Management of an institution.

- **Industry interaction**

The JKC and career guidance cell of the institution are in regular contact with various software companies as much as companies such as Dr. Reddy Laboratories, Infosys, Deccan fine chemicals etc., Synergizing the energies and capabilities of management, staff and students is the core strategy for mobilizing available human resource for the all-round development of the college.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc?) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The principal regularly updates the institutional information to the Commissioner Collegiate Education/RJDCE/University from time to time. The Governing Body is also kept informed. The Commissioner Collegiate Education himself seeks needful information in various formats. In case of anything urgent to be conveyed, the principal communicates through phone or e-mail. Circulars and Minutes of the staff meetings are filed, so that the staff who was absent can go through them to update themselves of the decisions

and discussions taken up during such meetings. The action taken by the IQAC on the feedback from the stakeholders received by various committees is promptly conveyed to the stakeholders during the subsequent meetings. The examination results and attendance of the students are displayed on the notice board.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

To encourage and support the involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process, the principal forms various committees. The committees are headed by faculties who have the requisite expertise and maintain cordial relationship with the other departments, to upgrade their skills and knowledge on various aspects. The committees help to minimize the bottlenecks in the functioning of the college. The institution maintains fair treatment to teaching as well as non-teaching staff in sharing of administrative responsibilities, and representation in committees. Based on the views and suggestions of these committees, the Principal takes appropriate decisions and future actions with the approval of the Governing Body. As many as 27 committees are constituted for effective and efficient administration.

- Resolution dated 2nd March 2014 of the college Governing Body “Resolved to promote and designate the senior most Aided lecturer of UG college Sri N.Lakshmana Rao, M.Sc., M.Phil., senior lecturer in chemistry as Principal, full additional charge on the retirement of the regular principal Sri C.Srinivasa Rao on 28-02-2014, until a regular principal is appointed.

Further resolved to authorize Sri N.Lakshmana Rao, Principal, FAC to operate all bank accounts of the college and deal with all financial transactions. The resolution was implemented in total.

- Resolution dated 31st August 2014 of the college Governing Body “Resolved that Sri V.Krishna Mohan, senior lecturer in commerce department senior most lecturer in the college is designated as Principal in charge of the college with effect from 1-9-2014.

In case the impending G.O. for extension of age of retirement from 58 years to 60 years comes into existence with retrospective effect Sri. N.Lakshmana Rao regular Principal will continue in office.

Mean while Sri V.Krishna Mohan, Principal in charge is authorized to operate all the college bank accounts and with all financial transactions of the college”.Accordingly Sri V.Krsihna Mohan, took over as Principal in charge of the college on 1-9-2014.

- Resolution dated 18th January 2015 of the college Governing Body “Resolved to implement the proceedings of the Commissioner of Collegiate Education and reinduct into services Sri N.Lakshmana Rao as Principal of the college with effect from 3-1-2015 and also as per the resolution of the Governing Body dated 31-08-2014 who will retire on attaining the age of 60 years as per the amended Act.The resolution was complied with and Sri N.Lakshmana Rao reassumed charge as principal of the college with effect from 3-1-2015 and is continuing in the same post as principal.

No, the UGC gives sanction for status of autonomy when a proposal is submitted by the college through proper channel.

For any grievances students can freely approach the appropriate committee that pay immediate attention, thus instilling confidence and paving way for better relationship among all stakeholders. No serious grievance has been reported.. To ascertain grievances and complaints of students, a grievance box is installed at the prominent place in the college. The grievance box is opened fortnightly. A grievance redressal cell is exclusively meant to attend to these problems

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No, there has been no instance of court cases filed by and against the institution during the last four years.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If ‘yes’, what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, the institution has mechanism for analysing the students’ feedback on institutional performance. The IQAC collects the feedback from the students about each teacher and the Institution during every academic year. The feedback is analysed and the principal meets each teacher individually to communicate the outcome. He discusses positive futuristic action. Since, students are also members of relevant committees; their opinions are also taken into consideration for various institutional changes.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies:

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The institution is committed to protect talent and interest areas of its faculty through various policies and practices.

- By encouraging faculty in attending orientation programmes and refresher courses for updating academic skills.
- By motivating the teaching and non-teaching staff to attend seminars, short-term courses and workshops pertaining to their expertise.
- The newly appointed faculty, most of them are being fresh pass outs from the university, are trained in areas such as teaching methodology, curricular plans, student psychology, use of ICT etc., to enhance the professional development.
- The fresher and recently transferred staff is exposed to the resources available/ developed by the experienced staff.
- The faculty is motivated to pursue research activities on FDP of UGC.
- Training in basic computer skills is imparted to the administrative staff to facilitate computerization of all aspects of administration.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

Faculty is extended facilities continuously for attending various seminars /conferences/ workshops and also motivated to become members of various academic activities of affiliated university and other academic organizations. They are encouraged to visit industries, institutes and research centres, to get more insights in acquiring updated knowledge in the respective domains. After attending to various academic activities, the faculty shares the explored experiences with the colleagues and drives the same into the minds of students. In such a way, the faculty is empowered to instill confidence among students for performing their role and executing responsibilities confidently. Thus, the effective leadership of the principal creates a cordial relationship among the faculty members for amicable functioning of the institution with a team work.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The performance appraisal format captures students' feedback on all round aspects of the teaching and learning. There is a self-appraisal by each member of the staff, being followed. Faculty submits the self-appraisal form to the extent of academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities done during the academic year. The state government has made it mandatory for the teachers to submit self appraisal reports to the academic advisors appointed by the CCE. On the basis of this, the principal and the IQAC meet each staff and discuss the feedback and guide on proactive/ remedial measures. The institution started a self-appraisal system for each staff. Measures and guidance are provided by the IQAC during its meeting.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The performance appraisal reports are reviewed continuously and appropriate measures are taken. It provides an insight about the perception of the different faculty members regarding the organizational culture prevailing in the college. All decisions and views of the administration are communicated to the stakeholders during the course of the subsequent meeting that helps in moving forward the activities with renewed vigor.

The following decisions are communicated to the stakeholders.

- To ensure accountability and empowerment a continuous interaction and self-assessment are to be carried out among the faculty, students and administration.
- The commitment of the faculty, transparency in administration and participatory leadership are to be sustained.
- On par with the external academic audit, an internal academic audit is to be followed by the IQAC.

- Pension; Contributory Pension; Family Pension schemes etc. 55% among the staff have availed the benefit of the above schemes in the last four years.
- Group Insurance for Students

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Some of the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty are:

- The Institution maintains congenial atmosphere with a positive work culture.
- Health insurance cards for all members of a family, loan facility and leave facility for their professional and personal needs.
- Institution encourages the faculty growth by providing FDP for pursuing research activity.

- Institution motivates the staff members who wish to pursue research work/social consultancy/introduction of innovative programmes etc.
- Handsome pay scales (UGC scales/State scales) for aided staff.
- Prompt and regular payment of Salaries.
- All teaching & non-teaching staff are placed on different scales.
- The pay scale is revised once in every five years in respect of the ones drawing state scales; and ten years for those drawing UGC scales.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

The budget is made annually. Conveners of the committees and in-charges of the departments submit their requirement through the indent to the principal. A comparative quotation is obtained, based on which the purchases are made. All transaction documents are kept in appropriate files. For immediate expenses, petty cash account is maintained. The institution has constituted various committees to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources.

The institution has both internal and external financial audit being done periodically. The external audit on all financial matters is performed by the officers of the Commissionerate, Collegiate Education A.P Hyderabad and Regional Joint Directorate, Collegiate Education. Last audit was done during sept, 2011 for the financial year 2010-11. There has been no major audit objection till date. Internal audit is carried out through Internal Audit Committee. After the conduct of the audit for external & internal, the objections and suggestions are submitted to the Principal and in turn the same will be communicated to the respective departments for prompt necessary action.

Yes, the college has an IQAC, which has been established at the instance of NAAC. The institution established an active IQAC in 2006 with a thrust on academic excellence. It acts as an instrument for developing the academic quality and administrative performance of the institution. It provides a platform for organizing workshops, seminars on the quality of education and coordinates all teaching learning activities of the institution. The mission of our college inspires us to strive for all round development of students, staff, infrastructure etc. The IQAC calls for a meeting with each committee. The IQAC monitors all the developmental activities of the committee and takes a systematic and consensual decision on further activities. The IQAC ensures that the action plans are in tandem with the quality requirements in every aspect. It performs academic audit. The IQAC prepares AQAR every year and submits to NAAC.

The college has strived to constantly review and enhance the quality in all spheres through the IQAC. Almost all the decisions of the IQAC have been approved and implemented. Further, internet facility had been extended to the library along with free internet access to the students. This was suggested by IQAC and implemented by the principal during 2012-13. c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes, the institutional IQAC has two external members, they are academicians and one of them is the Head of a Pharmaceutical Industry. They have contributed in terms of providing academic knowledge and skills and also suggested changes in infrastructure and procedures; e.g. Guiding and assisting our students, conducting workshops/seminar and guiding the students whenever possible.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

The IQAC strongly believes in making students, the role model by grooming them to be on the forefront of various activities concerning both institution and society. Feedback is taken from students at the beginning and end of the academic year on aspects like teaching, facilities provided by the college etc. The alumni deliver lectures and share their industry experience and skills with the students and staff. Suggestions are taken from the alumni spread across the globe through e-mails.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC involves all faculties from different departments of the institution in formulating major academic activities. The decisions of the IQAC are communicated to all departments.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If ‘yes’, give details on its operationalisation.

Yes, the institution has integrated framework to ensure the quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. There are different committees to look after various activities. The principal is the Chairperson for all the committees. The IQAC conducts meetings to provide a comprehensive review on institutional performance. The requirements and functioning of all the departments are periodically reviewed for taking appropriate measures.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If ‘yes’, give details enumerating its impact.

Yes, a workshop was conducted for the staff on quality assurance by inviting an expert, to brief the teaching and office staff about the quality assurance procedure. This has greatly helped the staff in understanding and maintaining documents, and for evolving systems and procedures, for effective and efficient functioning. The IQAC periodically sends notices to all departments regarding activities, files, registers, charts, teaching aids etc., to maintain academic quality.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If ‘yes’, how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes, the institution continuously undertakes academic audit internal as well as external. The academic council with the help of faculty members performs the internal audit. Generally, departments are asked to prepare the annual curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular plans of their departments, well in advance in the month of June every year. Academic council undertakes academic audit and performance of the students with respect to home & university examinations, curricular and extracurricular activities as per the Departmental/College plans. Feed back is taken both from students and faculty. It is discussed with the Principal and ward counsellors for improvement of their performance. External audit is conducted by academic auditors appointed by CCE.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The college complies with the requirements of the affiliating university and the quality requirements as described by the NAAC. Academicians, researchers and students are often interacted during various events like workshops, seminars etc. The IQAC takes into consideration all the feedback received by the committees from the stakeholders and drafts out policies incorporating those suggestions in alignment with the guidelines prescribed by the NAAC.

The faculty members closely monitor the changing trends and methods of teaching related to higher education. Informal interaction with the academic experts, scientists, social workers, social organizations, members of the society, students' feedback etc., are taken into account for strengthening teaching-learning process. Further, the institution updates all its teaching tools and infrastructural facilities to create a scientific learning. The institution continuously monitors teaching learning process by conducting and evaluating different home examinations, academic audit, students' feedback, teaching diaries and attendance registers.



7.1. Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The college undertakes an internal Green Audit of the campus and facilities such that there is no adverse impact on the environment in any manner. The activities in the college are such that they are in tune with the set environmental standards. All known environmental issues such as pollution of air/ water/ soil are addressed vis-à-vis the activities of the institution. The suggestions of the committee are implemented.

Experienced Botany faculty members take care of developing and maintaining greenery in the campus. No separate external green audit is conducted. However internal environmental audit has been conducted using the expertise of Dr.T.S.Ramakarishna, HOD, M.Sc.,Bio-Technology of the PG College.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly?

With the increasing energy demands college took an initiative to generate and utilize eco-friendly energy in the campus. Solar power plant is installed in the college on roof top of entrance building.

Awareness is generated regarding plastic pollution. Use of plastic cups and carry bags is banned in the college. Staff and students are advised to use cloth bags and paper bags both inside and outside the campus. Trash bins are installed at important places.

- **Energy conservation :**

Energy saving techniques are implemented.

- The lights and fans are switched off by floor peons or staff after completion of work of the day.
- Fans and lights in the staff rooms are switched off when the faculty moves out.
- Created awareness among staff and students on energy conservation.
- The institute propagates the importance of energy conservation by intimating staff and students to turn off the fans and lights whenever not needed.
- Awareness programme is conducted periodically for elaborating the importance of water resource and advised to close the tap water whenever not needed.

- Classrooms are constructed with sufficient cross ventilation and lights so that the use of electricity can be minimized.
- LCD monitors are used in the labs to consume less energy.
- Filament lamps / tube lights are being phased out and LED lamps are being installed.
- **Use of renewable energy:**
Solar panels with a capacity of 10K.W has been installed which is being used for street lights on the campus.
- **Water harvesting :**
 - To sustain the ground water availability the institution has adopted rain water harvesting system.
 - All open terraces are fitted with collection pipes which collect rain water and sent to the ground through drains which help recharging of ground water.
 - Rain water collected in a big tank at chemistry department for laboratory use as the rain water is devoid of ions and serves as an alternative to distilled water.
 - Rain water harvesting is taken up by way of soak pits.
- **Check dam Construction:**
Not applicable as the entire Konaseema is a plain area sans hills.
- **Efforts for Carbon Neutrality :**
 - Carbon neutrality is achieved by maintaining a green cover on the campus.
 - The dead leaves and waste papers are not allowed to be put on fire
 - The Leaves are buried in the soil itself.
 - The students park their vehicles in the vehicle shed near the main entrance vehicles are not allowed to ply inside the campus to control emission of gaseous pollutants.
- **Plantation:**
 - Plantation of saplings has been organized on various occasions with the enthusiastic participation of staff and students.
 - The institute has planted and maintained different varieties of flowering plants, Ornamental plants and shrubs to keep institute free from pollution.
 - NSS coordinators organized tree plantation activity internally and externally from time to time.
- **Hazardous waste management:** No hazardous waste is generated in this campus.

- **e-waste management**

e-waste is managed in such a way that it does not pose any threat to the environment within the campus and neighborhood. The old, out dated, non functional electronic items and computers are sold either in the second hand market or to the scrap purchases.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Several innovations have been introduced during post accreditation period which have created a positive impact on the overall functioning of the college. The criteriawise details are given hereunder

1. Innovations in curricular aspects:

- While following the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating University, care has been taken to incorporate latest developments pertaining to the topic while delivering the classroom lectures.
- Vertical mobility for various courses is ensured with the introduction of PG courses in the PG College in the same campus under the same Management.

2. Teaching, Learning and Evaluation:

- Digitization is initiated in teaching-learning to enhance quality.

3. Research, Consultancy and Extention:

- Aptitude for research has been promoted among the staff through motivation by the research committee. The efforts yielded positive results. As many as 12 staff members received Ph.Ds during post NAAC period.
- The consultancy provided by our faculty proved helpful to aqua formers in our area.
- Extention activities have all been taken up as part of the institution's social responsibility.

4. Infrastructure and learning resources:

- The action plans for the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities have been drawn innovatively such that the infrastructure in the departments and the library have been utilized to give a positive impact and the functioning of the college and earned the satisfaction of the stakeholders.

5. Student support and progression:

- The IQAC has encouraged the JKC, Career Guidance Cell, Women Empowerment Cell, NSS and NCC units, to extend maximum student support in all aspects and taken steps to ensure their progression.

6. Governance, Leadership and Management:

- A recent innovation is the introduction of Biometric attendance system for the teaching and non-teaching staff which promoted punctuality.
- As part of energy conservation measures Solar Lighting is installed.
- Centralised public address system extended to all classrooms is another innovation.

7. Innovations and Best Practices:

- Playing ‘Vandemataram’ over the centralized public address system before commencement of classes in the morning session has been promoting virtues of patriotism and brotherhood among the students.
- Training on computer skills to all non-teaching staff and promoting computation spirit among students through physical education have been taken up as ‘Best Practices’ which proved to be innovative ideas that helped our efforts for quality enhancement.

7.3 BEST PRACTICES

BEST PRACTICE – 1

1. Title of the Practice:

Computer training for Non-teaching Staff

2. Goal:

To computerize the college administration, upgrade the library services and to provide basic computer skills to the non-teaching staff.

3. The Context:

A lot of work is involved in sorting out applications for admissions, preparation of monthly salary bills, posting of marks, sending reports to higher authorities etc. Use of computers will minimize manual work and speed up the process.

4. The Practice:

The College is serving the higher education needs of nearly 2500 boys and girls mostly from the poorer sections of the society. Our library is one of the biggest libraries among the affiliated colleges in our state. As part of our drive towards enhancing quality in all aspects of the college administration and library services, the IQAC has provided computer training as a **short-term certificate course** to the secretarial staff in the principal's office, departments and the library. The teaching staff of the department of computer science have been drafted as resource persons. There are as many as.....computer systems with printers and internet. Training is provided in the following:

1. Basic computer skills
2. Windows
3. MS Office
4. Basic internet knowledge
5. Knowledge of hardware components & trouble shooting
6. Operation of xerox machine & reprography

The UGC XI plan grants under Allocation cum sanction under the scheme of Plan Block Grant and this has been utilized for conducting the training in two phases. In the first phase, the following sections of the principal's office have been identified for the training as they are all attached to the routine administrative work.

1. Accounts section
2. Scholarships
3. Cash section
4. UGC & IQAC
5. Examinations
6. Admissions

Training was also given to the following non-teaching staff of various departments and library engaged in secretarial duties.

1. Store keeper
2. Herbarium keeper
3. Museum keeper

4. Record assistant
5. Assistant librarian
6. Attendance section

The training for each batch was conducted for three months from Monday to Saturday. Lectures on theoretical aspects were followed by demonstration. Practical work was assigned for hands on experience under the guidance of resource persons.

The first phase training proved to be a success. Even senior office assistants who had no computer literacy till then became computer literates after the training. Even at the time of NAAC peer team visit in 2007, most of the administrative work including the preparation of salary bills of the teaching and non-teaching staff was done manually as staff didn't have much of computer literacy. The processing of applications for admissions, scholarships, examinations etc, used to take lot of time and involved much paper work.

5. Evidence of Success:

The success of the practice is clearly seen. All the sections of the principal's office are now fully computerized. Manual work is reduced to a minimum. Pay bills, admissions, scholarships etc. are computerized. Official correspondence is mostly online. Any data can be retrieved quickly from the folders. Staff and students receive services from office and library rather quickly.

6. Problems encountered and resource required

The proposal to organise computer training for the non-teaching staff initially met with some resistance as the senior staff accustomed to manual work were reluctant to undergo the training. Their hesitation was because of a wrong notion that computer work involves lot of strain and that it would be beyond their level of comprehension. It was only after the principal and IQAC coordinator explained the importance of computers in updating the administration and improving the overall quality to stand up in the present times that they finally agreed. Their fears were allayed. After the first batch was trained and started using computers the others realized the great advantage of computerization and lined up for the training in the next batch. All their fears were proved baseless. Resources are required for full automation of the office and library. Computer systems with old configuration should be replaced with new systems with latest configuration.

BEST PRACTICE –2

1. Title of the Practice:

Developing the spirit of competition among students through physical education

2. Goal:

- To fully develop the talents of the students in Sports and Games
- To make our students good Sportspersons
- To prepare the students for higher level performance
- To utilize the available infrastructure facilities for Sports and Games and provide positive encouragement to students

3. The Context:

The NAAC peer team that visited our college in March 2007 observed, inter alia, “The college has produced outstanding Sportspersons at the University, State and National levels”. It is often said that a ‘Sound Mind Dwells in a Sound Body’. The golden pages of recorded world history reveal the fact that the harmonious blend of a strong body and healthy mind is indispensable directly for the success in any human endeavour. Sound mind and sound body – the twin superb forces of ‘human phenomenon’ are the chief agents which promote and propagate the high social virtues and moral ideals in the field of physical education, Sports, health and recreation. Like body and mind, education and physical education do a lot substantially for self realization, manifestation of perfection and complete living. Education and physical education should go hand in hand. Physical education is the education of the mind and body. It is part and parcel of the general education process.

The youth of the country should develop a spirit of competition and help to build a glorious and prosperous India. The emphasis on physical fitness of the youth will make our nation a healthy one.

Games and Sports develop self confidence and self-reliance among our students. They also develop attitudes and character needed for effective exchanges like reducing shyness etc. Realising the need for giving a phillip to our Sportspersons, a sincere effort is made to develop a spirit of competition which is hailed as the 'Best Practice' by all the stakeholders of the college.

4. The Practice:

Ever since the college was established in 1951, our Basket Ball teams used to show extraordinary talents in inter-university and inter-collegiate Games competitions and achieved success year after year bringing laurels to the college. However for the past 15 years the department of physical education noticed that most of the students (Boys and Girls) joining in the college had talents in various other Games and Sports also. Accordingly, boys and girls showing interest in Sports and Games have been identified and given Coaching in Cricket, Volley Ball, Athletics, Shuttle-Badminton, Weight Lifting, Power Lifting, Best Physique etc., besides Basket Ball.

Having won appreciation of the NAAC Peer Team in 2007 for the achievements of our students in the arena of Sports and Games, intramural Games were conducted for a large number of students. Students who exhibited excellent performance were identified and training was given with the help of external Coaches. The following experts acted as Coaches

1. Sri. R. Chinna Reddy, Andhra University, Basket Ball Coach
2. Sri N. Appala Raju, Army AOC, Basket Ball International Coach
3. Sri. Ch. Chandra Sekhar, National Boxing Referee cum Coach
4. Sri. B. Ramu, Army Athletic Coach

To achieve the goals, the infrastructure has been improved. In 2008 the following items were purchased utilizing funds sanctioned by the Management.

1. Abdominal Gym
2. Four stationed Gym
3. Weights
4. Bumbles
5. Plates
6. Home Gym
7. Weight lifting set

In 2013, with Rs.50,000/- of UGC funds the following items were purchased

1. Weight lifting set
2. Basket Ball fiber boards
3. High jump pit
4. TT boards
5. Lawn mover
6. Elliptical trainer
7. Vibrator machine etc.

In 2010-11 construction works of the multipurpose indoor training facility were started with Rs.70 lakh UGC funds. A 50 Bedded Sports hostel has been sanctioned at an estimated cost of Rs.75 lakh.

The following Excellent reference books have been purchased from Sports publication, New Delhi.

1. Athletic skills rules
2. Sociology of Sports and Physical Education
3. Curriculum in physical education
4. Training and Coaching in Sports
5. Hand book of exercise physiology
6. Prevention and treatment of Sports injuries
7. Hand book of Sports nutrition

All these books and the weekly magazine ‘Sports Star’ have been made available to the students.

5. Evidence of Success:

1. In inter-collegiate Athletic Meets our students won 12 Gold Medals, 11 Silver Medals and 9 Bronze Medals during 2007 - 2015.
2. In weight lifting, power lifting and best physique competitions our students bagged 25 Gold Medals, 30 Silver Medals and 40 Bronze Medals during 2007 - 2015.
3. Our teams were winners for 3 times and runners for 4 times in basket ball during 2007 - 2015.
4. In Tennis our teams were winners for 6 times and runners for 2 times during 2007 - 2015.

The winning spree continued. Our teams exhibited impressive performance in other events such as weight lifting, power lifting, best physique and shuttle and won several prizes and championships. Our teams comprising 50 students participated in the All India Inter University competitions and South Zone

Inter University competitions also during 2007 – 2015 representing Andhra University and Adikavi Nannaya University.

6. Problems encountered and resource required:

In fact no problems were encountered in the implementation of this ‘Best Practice’. Parents fully cooperated in sending the girl students to various Games and Sports competitions outside the college. However, very often providing boarding facilities to the participants in the competitions become a problem due to paucity of funds. Hence, it is imperative that adequate resources are made available to promote Games and Sports in all Higher Educational Institutions.

Weakness:

- An old gas plant run on petrol is still being used for gas supply to all the seven laboratories. The maintenance of the plant proves to be prohibitively costly.

- Pass percentage of the students is far from satisfactory.
- Almost 50% of the faculty members of the department are unaided teachers, a fall-out of the government policies.
- The poor academic background and the lack of economic as well as academic support for the students in their environment is an impediment to achieve learning outcomes quickly.

Opportunities:

- During the three years course of study with chemistry as an optional subject the students acquire theoretical knowledge of various modern concepts of chemistry and acquire experimental skill in analysis and synthesis. This knowledge throws open many job opportunities in pharmaceutical and chemical industries besides research labs.

Challenges:

- The teachers face the real challenge to fill the skill gaps and knowledge gaps of the students joining a course with poor academic background. It becomes imperative for the faculty to devise suitable strategies to bring them up on par with fast learners.
- Due to the absence of employment opportunities in the central delta the educated youth have to migrate to far off places in search of livelihood.

Future plans:

- Efforts are underway to replace the existing petrol gas plant with LPG to cut down the expenditure.
- To incorporate ICT to greater extent in teaching –learning process

More multi – disciplinary and multi – skill development PG Courses like M.Sc Biotechnology, M.Sc Nano Technology, M.B.A etc, could be introduced.

Action Taken:

In response to the suggestion the following steps were taken.

- M.Sc Biotechnology was started in the academic year 2008-09 with an intake of 30 students.
- Excellent infrastructure was provided including PCR, electrophoresis, equipment, UV-Visible spectrophotometer and cooling centrifuges.
- Fully qualified faculty and adequate infrastructure have been provided in keeping with the Andhra University norms.
- 2nd year MBA course was started in the academic year **2008-09** with intake of 60 students. Fully qualified faculty and the necessary infrastructure has been provided as per AICTE and Andhra University norms.

Suggestion 2

To enhance the employability to the students, certificate courses and add – on courses relevant to different disciplines could be started. The academic committee discussed the feasibility of starting certificate courses that would give employment opportunities to our students.

Action Taken:

Based on the recommendations of the committee the following short – term certificate courses were introduced.

A) Computer skills

The course was inaugurated by Sri D.Somasundar, State President, APUWJ on 19.9.2011 syllabus for the course was framed by IQAC with the help of Resource persons Sri.M.N.V.Prasad, Journalist was the Guest Speaker on 16.11.2011. Sri.M.Srirama Murthy, District President APUWJ delivered a guest lecturer on “Journalistic Ethics” on 27.9.2011.

Sri.K.Amar Nadh, member PCI delivered a guest lecturer on “Media and Press council” on 22.12.2011.

CRITERION II: Teaching, Learning & Evaluation**Suggestion:**

Increased application of Computer technology in teaching and administration shall be treated as a priority need for overall quality enhancement.

Action Taken:

- All the teachers are motivated to use Computer technology in teaching. Power point presentation is used whenever necessary using the LCD Projectors available.
- The websites of several of various organizations are searched by the teachers for up to date information concerning certain topics and the information downloaded and passed onto the students.
- Computer technology is fully utilized in administration. Admission lists, salary bills of staff, notices to staff & students, correspondence with higher authorities etc are all done using computer technology.
- Biometric attendance system is introduced to enforce punctuality of the staff.

CRITERION III: Research, Consultancy & Extension**Suggestion:**

The faculty motivated to apply to UGC and other funding agencies for research projects.

Action Taken:

The research committee motivates all the staff members to apply to the UGC for minor as well as major research projects. During the post NAAC period i.e 2007-2015, same faculty members were sanctioned UGC funds for the research Projects.

CRITERION IV: Infrastructure and learning Resources**Suggestion1:**

Infrastructure facilities of the department staff rooms of humanities and social sciences ought to be improved.

Action Taken:

All the staff rooms including those of the HEPA departments are provided with the infrastructure such as chairs, tables, ceiling fans, tube lights and attached toilets. Drinking water facility is provided. Steel almirahs are provided to keep files, registers etc.

Suggestion 2:

All the departments shall be provided with Computers with internet facility.

Action Taken:

This suggestion was implemented in toto. All the departments are now having Computers with internet facility. Same are having printers. Free Wi-Fi facility is available in the Campus.

Suggestion 3:

The College office and the library which are partially automated need to be fully automated.

Action Taken:

Automation of the library is almost completed. Issue of Books to students using bar coding is nearing completion. Lists of books of various titles are computerized.

College office is now fully automated. Administrative work is being carried out using computer technology.

Suggestion 4:

More copies of text books need to be made available in the central library.

Action Taken:

Keeping in view the changes in the curriculum text books and reference books of various subjects have been purchased and made available to the students.

CRITERION V: Student Support and Progression**Suggestion1:**

A common computer center with at least 30 systems shall be established to sensitize the students who have not opted for computer courses.

Action Taken:

As per Andhra University curriculum for all students of B.A,B.Com and B.Sc who don't have computers as one of the optionals, Computer Course (Course I for First year and course II for second year) was introduced as a special & compulsory paper each for 100 marks. Accordingly computer literacy with working knowledge was imparted successfully.

For B.Com., (computers) and B.Sc., (computers) a special & compulsory paper on Computer Skills (skills I for 1st year and skills II for 2nd year) was introduced by the Andhra University.

Suggestion2:

Effective steps need to be taken to enhance the success rate of the UG Students

Action Taken:

The academically backward students identified by internal evaluation have been given counseling individually and collectively by the faculty members concerned. Steps are taken to improve their comprehension levels by organizing remedial classes. Study material is supplied free of cost on certain special topics. However, socio-economic back ground of the students mostly from the rural areas may be cited as a reason for poor levels of competence.

Suggestion:

Canteen facility needs improvement.

Action Taken:

The canteen facility is improved to cater to the needs of the students and staff. The canteen located on the first floor of the Bank Block at the main gate is spacious with separate enclosures for boys and girls. The canteen is open from 9 AM to 5 PM Coffee, tea , tiffin and snacks are available. Hygienic conditions are maintained.

CRITERION VI: Leadership, Governance and Management

The peer team while appreciating the single minded devotion of the management in running the affairs of the College coupled with the commitment exhibited by the teaching community and the team work exhibited by the administrative staff gave the following suggestion.

Suggestion:

The peer team feels that the college possesses the potential to become an autonomous institution. Efforts may be initiated in this direction.

Action Taken:

This valuable suggestion of the peer team is taken note of by the management. The matter came up for discussion at all levels and a decision has been deferred.

CRITERION VII: Innovation and Best Practices

There was no specific suggestion by the peer team with regard to Criterion VII. However the peer team in its report appreciated the participatory and democratic structure in the college. Recognition given to the best-performing teacher every year by the management by instituting an award and payment of EPF for the unaided staff (Teaching & Non-Teaching) also came up for a special mention.

The peer team while offering some valuable suggestions as mentioned above also made some commendations.

Several teachers of the college receiving State Best Teacher Awards came in for appreciation. The right academic ambience by providing spacious, well maintained and green campus besides the commitment exhibited by the teaching community and the team work shown by the administrative staff was highlighted.

The peer team praised the institution – industry interaction established by the College through MoUs as well as the excellent relationship between the college and local community.

Well maintained science laboratories and uniquely elegant Zoology museum were specifically mentioned. Participation of NCC cadets in the Republic Day parade in New Delhi, and various national level camps was taken note of by the peer team. The esteemed members of the peer team also appreciated the contributions of the Alumni as well as the laurels brought by the Sports teams in various events.

Extolling the single minded devotion of the Management, the peer team expressed satisfaction over the running of the College on sound lines.

Driven by the quality consciousness ignited by the NAAC assessment & accreditations the college successfully conducted five UGC sponsored national seminars besides one NAAC sponsored national seminar. Two short – term certificate courses were also conducted.

As many as ten faculty members have been awarded Ph.D and five have been awarded M.Phil degrees in the post NAAC period.



Sree Konaseema Bhanoji Ramars College, Amalapuram, Andhra Pradesh volunteered to be assessed by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore and submitted a self study report in January 2007. Accordingly, a Peer Team consisting of the following members was constituted by the NAAC to visit the institution for the validation of the self study report and for the assessment of the institution.

The Peer Team members visited the College during 15 - 17 March, 2007. It held separate meetings with the Principal, management, faculty, students, parents and alumni. It examined different documents and records made available besides visiting all the departments and the various facilities of the College. Based on the personal interaction with the various groups and on a careful study of the facts and figures provided, the Peer Team has made a comprehensive assessment of Sree Konaseema Bhanoji Ramars College, Amalapuram and all its activities under the seven criteria laid down by the NAAC and the same is presented in the following report.

Section 1 : INTRODUCTION

Sree Konaseema Bhanoji Ramars College, Amalapuram was established in 1951 as a II Grade college affiliated to the Andhra University. The College was started by Sree Konaseema College Committee consisting of a few philanthropists of the region with the mission of imparting value based, need based and career oriented quality education to the young men and women belonging to the rural areas of Konaseema. S.K.B.R College is a grant-in-aid institution recognized by the UGC under 20 and 12(b) of the UGC Act of 1956. The College is situated in a 33.03-acre

campus of Peruru grama panchayat in the East Godavari District of Andhra Pradesh. It is a composite degree college. It offers 20 courses including 14 self-funded courses. Semester system is followed in the P G programmes while the UG courses are offered under annual system. The institution works in two shifts mainly to accommodate Intermediate classes. The College has a student strength of 2261 (excluding Intermediate) out of which 1497 are boys and 764 are girls. There are 2114 students in the UG courses and 147 in the P G courses. At present 56 permanent teachers and 50 temporary teachers along with 100 non-teaching staff and a technical assistant serve in the institution. The unit cost of education is Rs.21,851.95 including the salary component and Rs.710.05 excluding the salary component.

Section 2 : CRITERION-WISE ANALYSIS

CRITERION I : CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The programmes of teaching and learning are consistent with the goals and objectives of the College. As the SKBR College is under the affiliating system, it follows the syllabi and examination pattern prescribed by the Andhra University. The College offers 18 Under Graduate courses including 5 B.A., 12 B.Sc and 1 B.Com courses of which, two B.A., nine B.Sc and one B.Com. programmes are self - financing. The College also offers M.C.A and M.Sc (Organic Chemistry) courses at the Post Graduate level. The medium of instruction for all the PG courses and self financing courses is in English. All the B.A / B.Sc / B.Com programmes are offered with three main subjects. While different combinations of History, Economics, Political Science, Special Telugu, Special English, Local Self Governments are offered under the B.A Degree programme, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Statistics, Botany, Zoology, Computer Science, Electronics, Biotechnology, Biochemistry and Petrochemicals are the subjects of the various B.Sc programmes. B.Com programme has subjects like Commerce, Computer Science, Economics, etc. The Peer Team appreciates the efforts of the College to start a number of need-based new generation programmes like Biotechnology, Biochemistry, Computer Application, Electronics and Petrochemicals mainly at the UG level. More such programmes need to be introduced at the PG level too.

Being an affiliated college, the institution does not have much flexibility to introduce new programmes or to make changes in the syllabi. However some of the senior teachers of the College are members of the Boards of Studies of the Andhra University and are actively involved

in the redesigning and revision of the syllabi.

On the whole, the different programmes and the syllabi followed provide ample opportunity for qualitative education for the students. Various personal, vocational, practical and creative skills are developed through curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

CRITERION II : TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The students are admitted to different UG courses on the basis of their academic performance in the qualifying examinations. However, admissions to the two PG programmes of M.C.A and M.Sc (Organic Chemistry) are made by the Andhra University through the common entrance tests of ICET and AUCET respectively. The admission procedures laid down by the University and the Government are strictly followed by the College. The reservation criteria prescribed by the government are adhered to regarding the admissions of Scheduled Castes / Scheduled Tribes / backward classes / physically handicapped / sports persons, etc.

The College conducts a post-admission test for the newly admitted students soon after the admissions and also two months after the commencement of classes in order to identify the slow and advanced learners. Most of the departments offer remedial coaching for the slow learners. The College does not have any tutorial system. No bridge courses are offered either.

The S.K.B.R College follows an academic calendar as per the guidelines of the University. Teaching plan is formulated in each department at the beginning of the academic year and each teacher prepares month-wise annual academic plan. A teacher-in-charge is appointed for each class. The academic progress of the students is monitored through conducting slip tests, quarterly and half-yearly examinations, assignments, etc. Classroom lectures are supplemented with seminars, quiz, group discussions, practical sessions, field trips, study tours, etc. in order to make learning more student-centered. Guest lectures are arranged by inviting eminent scholars, subject experts and former members of the faculty. Audio-visual aids like LCD projector, overhead projector, computers, charts, models, etc are also made use of to make teaching and learning process more effective. Evaluation methods and dates of examinations are communicated to students well in advance. Of late, the College has introduced the system of preparing question banks for various subjects and questions are selected at random by computer for different tests and evaluation. The outcome of the evaluation is regularly intimated to the parents through progress reports.

Appointment of permanent teachers is done as per the government and university guidelines. Although there exists much delay on the part of the government in filling vacancies, the College Management has made all efforts to appoint temporary teachers in these vacancies in order to ensure smooth functioning of the institution. Teacher development is promoted by the Management by granting study leave to teachers for pursuing higher studies and by encouraging them to attend refresher courses and orientation programmes.

Computer training classes have also been initiated for the faculty in order to sensitize them on the use of ICT-enabled teaching. The Management evaluates the performance of the teachers mainly through the feedback from the students and also on the basis of the self-appraisals obtained from the faculty. It is noteworthy that three teachers of the College have been recognized for excellence in teaching by the Government of Andhra Pradesh as Best Teachers during the last five years.

CRITERION III : RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Since S.K.B.R College is offering mostly UG courses, research is not a significant academic activity of the institution. However, the College has constituted a research committee for promoting aptitude for research among the staff and students. At present, among the 56 permanent teachers, 5 have Ph.D degree and 10 have M.Phil degree while among the temporary teachers, two are Ph.D degree holders and 5 have M. Phil degree. Currently 4 faculty members are engaged in Ph.D / M.Phil research under the Faculty Improvement Programme of the UGC. Apart from this, 21 teachers are pursuing Ph.D/M.Phil. programmes on part-time basis. Some of the teachers have completed a few minor research projects in the past. At present there are two minor ongoing research projects. There is no recognized research guide among the faculty. It is pertinent to mention that one of the lecturers in the Department of Zoology has research collaboration with a researcher in the Texas A&M University, USA in connection with his Ph. D work. It is noteworthy that several faculty members provide guidance to students for carrying out research projects which is not part of the curriculum.

A few of the teachers have published articles in research journals and have also presented research papers in seminars and workshops. More faculty members need to be encouraged to publish papers in refereed national and international journals and to take up minor / major

research projects by applying to the UGC and other funding agencies. The College has initiated collaboration with several research institutes and industries. However, the Peer Team feels that these must be institutionalised.

The S.K.B.R College offers some kind of consultancy services like water quality analysis to the aqua farmers, technical advice for organizing science exhibitions to school teachers in the district, etc. But, all these consultancy services are offered free of cost.

The College has several extension activities carried out mainly through the NSS and NCC units. Several teachers and students participated in the total literacy programme (Akshara Godavari) and Janmabhoomi (Self- Help Programme) aimed at sustained community development. Some of the extension programmes like village survey related to the Annual Status of Education Report are carried out in collaboration with NGOs. One of the faculty members has been serving as resource person for the community development programmes of the Government. The recently set up 'Women Welfare, Extension and Study Centre' of the College aims at extension activities related to women empowerment.

The College has established academic linkages with Coconut Research Station, Ambajipeta; Municipal Water Filtration Plant, Amalapuram; ONGC Mini Oil Refinery, Tatipaka; Dr. Reddy's Labs, Yanam; Regency Ceramics, Yanam, etc.

CRITERION IV : INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

S.K.B.R College has reasonably good physical infrastructure to support the existing programmes. The total built-in area is 6866.7 sq. meters consisting of the administrative block and 13 other blocks housing class rooms, laboratories, library and other facilities.

Over the years, the management has built up different buildings and facilities based on the needs of the institution. There are altogether 42 class rooms which are spacious and well-ventilated. The different science laboratories are well - maintained. The College has a good air-conditioned seminar hall as well as an open-air auditorium. The College successfully raised about Rs. 30 lakhs from different donors for the construction of two new blocks during the last five years.

The central library has about 63,500 books. The library is kept open from 7.30 am to 7.30 pm on all working days for the benefit of students belonging to both the shifts. It has a book bank facility for the use of SC and ST students. Though the library subscribes to several journals,

periodicals and magazines, the number of research journals needs to be enhanced to facilitate research. The departments of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Computer Science have departmental libraries in addition to the central library. The central library has internet and reprographic facilities. The central library may be fully computerised in order to improve its functioning. Facilities like waiting rooms for girls, canteen, firing range, health center, etc are also available.

The College has five well-maintained air-conditioned computer labs apart from the newly established language laboratory. There are 20 computers each in the B.Sc Computers labs, 71 in the two M.C.A labs and 31 in the B.Com computer lab. Internet facility is provided free of cost to the M.C.A students and is accessible for all the teachers. The S.K.B.R College has good infrastructural facilities for various sports and games. The College has a 400 meter track and the facilities for playing cricket, football, basket ball, volley ball, tennis, table tennis, shuttle badminton and different indoor games. The institution promotes sports activities by providing incentives to outstanding sports persons.

The infrastructure facilities of the college are found to be optimally utilized. The facilities of the College are used for conducting various competitive examinations by the APPSC, banks, etc and also for spot valuation by the Andhra University. The spacious ground of the college are extensively utilized during natural calamities as the institution serves as a rehabilitation / distribution centre during such times.

CRITERION V : STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

In S.K.B.R College, the proportion of students appearing for the qualifying examination after the minimum period of study is above 99 per cent and the drop out rate is only 4.63 per cent. The average success rates of the students in the UG courses was 42.15 per cent which is rather low and that for the PG courses was 96.2 per cent during the last academic year. Majority of the successful UG students go for further studies. Though the College does not maintain any placement record, it is reported that most of the PG students get employed after the completion of the course. Many of them appear for NET, SLET, TOFEL, GMAT, etc also.

The College Prospectus provides information to the students about the courses offered, fee structure, etc. Hand Book of the College contains details related to academic schedule, code of

conduct, faculty, syllabus, rules and regulations and the various facilities available.

More than 60 per cent of the students belong to SC, ST and BC categories. They get the benefit of the various social welfare scholarships from the Government. During the last academic year, an amount of Rs. 28,70,880 was given to students belonging to economically and socially disadvantaged communities and categories by way of social welfare scholarships. Merit scholarships as well as merit cum means scholarships are also available for the students. Prizes, cash incentives, games kit, etc are provided to students who are proficient in sports. Remedial coaching classes are arranged for academically backward students. Book Bank facility is available at the central library for SC / ST students.

Recently the College has set up a Career Guidance and Placement Cell which offers counseling services to the students on employment opportunities and it has also started arranging campus interviews. The Peer Team feels that these activities need to be strengthened and that entrepreneurial orientation needs to be imparted. The College has a separate counseling center for women students with a senior lady teacher as its convenor. Though a few teachers give academic and personal counseling, the College needs to have a qualified counselor.

The S.K.B.R College has an active and supportive Alumni Association. The institution has produced several illustrious alumni during the last fifty six years of its existence. It includes several High Court Judges, Vice-Chancellors, a UPSC Chairman, MPs and MLAs, prominent administrators, bankers, artists, professionals, political leaders, etc. The Alumni Association generously contributes to the growth and development of the College.

The students of the College are provided with ample recreational / leisure time facilities and opportunities to join various clubs and associations, competitions, cultural programmes, sports and games and the like. The College has produced outstanding sportspersons at the university, state and national levels.

The College has set up a Discipline Committee to deal with student indiscipline and complaints if any. The Women Development and Counseling Cell is constituted to receive complaints regarding eve teasing, sexual harassment, etc. All the stake holders of the College the Peer Team met paid rich tributes to the institution for maintaining strict discipline over the years.

CRITERION VI: ORGANISATION AND MANAGEMENT

The Governing Body of the College manages the administrative affairs of the institution. The

Correspondent of the College is also the Secretary of the College Governing Body. The Governing Body meetings are held regularly to take decisions regarding the administration of the College. The Management meets the staff at least four times in an academic year.

The S.K.B.R College has an effective internal co-ordinating and monitoring mechanism regarding the various academic and administrative functions of the institution. The Principal of the College is the academic head of the institution who is in charge of the day-to-day academic administration. He is assisted by the Heads of Departments and the Staff Council. Different committees are formed at the beginning of the academic year to look after and co-ordinate various curricular and co-curricular activities of the College and different departments. Every academic year, a committee consisting of senior faculty members is constituted for preparing an academic calendar which is prepared in accordance with the guidelines of the Andhra University. The Staff Council consists of the Principal, HODs and staff representative. The Principal ensures the work efficiency of the non-teaching staff with the assistance of the Office Superintendent.

The College follows the rules and regulations of the University and the Government in the appointment of both teaching and non-teaching staff. The Management constitutes a committee consisting of the Principal, Head of the Department and Governing Body members which periodically appraises the performance of the teaching staff and gives them suggestions for improvement. Another sub-committee is constituted by the Management for monitoring the performance of the non-teaching staff periodically. The College has started giving training to the faculty members in the use computers, internet and audio-visual aids. Non-teaching staff are also given training in the use of computers.

All the finances of the College are subject to auditing every year.

CRITERION VII : HEALTHY PRACTICES

- 1 Participatory and democratic administrative structure.
- 2 The assistance given by the Management to the faculty for presenting papers in conferences and seminars by meeting the T.A. and D.A. and registration fees either fully or partially.
- 3 Recognition given to the best-performing teacher every year by the management by instituting an award.

- 4 Management paying the E.P.F. for the unaided staff - both teaching and non-teaching.
- 5 Financial assistance extended by the management to the staff members during times of crisis.
- 6 Teaching Diaries, Teaching Notes and Teaching Plan are maintained by the faculty.
- 7 Access to internet has been made available at free of cost to both faculty and students.
- 8 Subject relevant mini projects by the under graduate students.
- 9 Student Profiles are maintained in every department.
- 10 Outreach programmes by the N.S.S. and the N.C.C. volunteers like helping the poor rural school children in their studies, AIDS awareness campaign, blood donation camps, etc are noteworthy.
- 11 The College campus being made available as a rehabilitation center during times of natural calamities.

Section III : OVERALL ANALYSIS

The S.K.B.R College has been meaningfully serving the society for the past five and a half decades with well-defined goals and objectives. The Peer Team would like to appreciate the institution for taking the following steps for sustaining and enhancing the quality of education imparted.

COMMENDATIONS

- 1 The single minded devotion of the management in running the affairs of the College coupled with the commitment exhibited by the teaching community and the team work shown by the administrative staff.
- 2 The spacious, well maintained and green campus provide the right academic ambience.
- 3 Well - maintained science laboratories and uniquely elegant Zoology museum are worth mentioning.
- 4 Several teachers of the College being honoured by the state government by conferring Best Teacher awards.
- 5 Participation of N.C.C. cadets in the Republic Day Parade at New Delhi, various national level camps, etc is commendable.
- 6 Laurels brought by the Basket Ball and Volley Ball teams, Power Lifting, Weight Lifting

- by individual sports persons through their consistent outstanding performance at State and National levels are praiseworthy.
- 7 The institution - industry interaction established by the College through MOUs.
- 8 Excellent relationship between the College and local community.
- 9 Willingness of the alumni, many of whom occupying important positions in various walks of life to contribute their mite for the betterment of the institution.

SUGGESTIONS

The College may take the following initiatives in the years to come for the effective functioning and future growth and development of the institution so that it can compete with other premier higher educational institutions.

- 1 More multi - disciplinary and multi - skill development P.G courses like M.Sc. Bio-Technology, M.Sc. Nano Technology, M.B.A., etc could be introduced.
- 2 To enhance the employability of the students, certificate courses and add-on courses relevant to different disciplines could be started.
- 3 Effective steps need to be taken to enhance the success rate of the U.G. students.
- 4 The faculty be motivated to apply to U.G.C and other funding agencies for research projects.
- 5 A common computer center with at least 30 systems shall be established to sensitise students who have not opted for computer courses.
- 6 All the departments shall be provided with computers with internet facility.
- 7 Infrastructure facilities of the department staff rooms of humanities and social sciences ought to be improved.
- 8 Increased application of computer technology in teaching and administration shall be treated as a priority need for overall quality enhancement.
- 9 The College office and the library which are partially automated need to be fully automated.
- 10 More copies of text books need to be made available in the central library.
- 11 Canteen facility needs improvement.
- 12 The Peer Team feels that the College possesses the potential to become an autonomous institution. Efforts may be initiated in this direction.


